FROM THE PEN OF CON McCOALE

Inavale, Nebr., Dec. 20, 1914. Editor Red Cloud Chief:

When this cruel and horrible war is over it is admitted by almost everyone that there will be a considerable change in the map of Europe and perhaps of the old world. There will be a wide contrast between the geography now in the hands of the school children and then. The names of many of the larger towns and cities, especially, will be changed, and many spots, now historic in the war zone, but formerly nameless, will then receive one. The rivers will run as they are now, and the mountains remain the same.

But this change in geography will not be confined to the one subject alone, as it will effect and make a complete change in most or all of the other subjects taught in school, especially spelling and grammar will be different, with their rules and definitions, pronunciation, classification, derivation and connotations. The latter if not a subject, is sure to be an object.

New matter will be brought into the arithmetic, both in simple and compound proportion, such as the following example: If a certain amount of ammunition is required to kill 53 officers and 206 privates, how much ammunition will be required to kill 798 officers and a million of privates? Reduction, fractions, dividing, multiplying, subtracting and adding all will be brought into play. Agriculture or practical farming will experience a complete change, and will require special attention, as no judicious or scientific notations are being made during the war, but, alas, a rotation contrary to the laws of God and man, viz: raising wheat one year and hundreds of thousands of poor human dead carcasses the following year. Or in other words, two crops on the same land the same year, and making it still more unsystematic and sacrilegious, trodden down, burned and left to rot. Such a course really cries aloud for redress and restitution.

Some slight changes will also be made in geometry. The problems will have a complicated touch to them and be more difficult to prove. Book-keeping, both single and double entry, also will appear very obscure to young beginners, as a considerable change will present itself in the stock, profit and loss and balance accounts.

I am glad I am not to go to school in these days.
