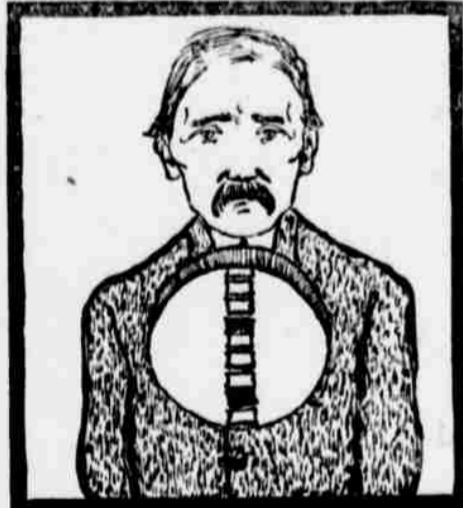

AS WE SEE IT

R. L. Metcalfe of the Omaha Nebraska has asked us for our position on making the liquor question a part of the democratic platform and we have replied to him as follows:

"Dear Bro. Metcalfe—Replying to your inquiry regarding the position which we expect to take regarding the liquor question will say that we can not consider this a partisan measure. By partisan we mean incorporating it into present political parties. It should be settled on its own merits. We believe it should be submitted to the people separately and kept out of party platforms.

"After all a state is only an enlarged picture of our cities and towns, and our experience here in Red Cloud has been that when the wet and dry issue was fought out with parties and candidates, our city affairs suffered greatly, regardless of which sentiment won out at the election. Just because a man is wet or dry is no indication that he will make a good or poor city official. A few years ago we adopted the plan of nominating our candidates and voting directly on the wet and dry question and the officers elected carry out the wishes of the people as expressed by their votes. We transfer the fight from persons to principle and the result is very satisfactory. By all means keep this question out of the party platform.

Horticultural Notes

Altho February may not be the best time of the year to do pruning in Nebraska, the rush of spring work makes it desirable frequently to begin pruning this month. All dead wood should not only be cut off but be burned. Cross branches should be cut off and the top of fruit trees thinned out so that the sun can reach every part of the tree some time during the day. The little crooked branches should not be removed, as these are the fruit spurs. Every one taken off means the permanent loss of fruit.

On account of the prevalence of this disease, it is well to disinfect all wounds with carbolic acid or some other disinfectant. It is also wise to disinfect the cutting parts of pruning tools with kerosene after pruning each tree. In all pruning, care should be taken not to leave any stubs. These rot back, make it hard for the wound to heal, and leaves the spot open to infection.

Grapes should be pruned before the buds start in the spring. It is important to remember in pruning them that the buds which produce the crop this year should be chosen from the canes a year old, growing on two-year-old arms. Generally from 30 to 40 buds or "eyes" distributed over four or five canes may be saved, but this depends upon the vigor of the vine.

Ayrshire Makes Big Record

Lady Lincoln, one of the comparatively few Ayrshire cows in Nebraska and owned by the State University dairy department, produced in one year 14,778 pounds of milk and 511.57 pounds of butter fat, according to a test recently completed. This is said to be probably the largest record of any Ayrshire cow in Nebraska. Lady Lincoln was seven years and seven months of age when she finished her record and has completed five yearly milking periods which average 11,708 pounds of milk and 397 pounds of butter fat.

Altho there are only a few Ayrshire cattle in Nebraska, dairymen say that they are giving excellent satisfaction where tried and are gaining in popularity. The Ayrshire cow is noted for her hardiness and her ability as a rustler. It is characteristic of her to give a rather large amount of milk of average richness. The breed has not made such phenomenal records as the other leading dairy breeds, but as a rule the cows are persistent and economical producers of both milk and butter fat.

Mold Poison In Horses

Reports from several localities show a considerable loss among horses running in cornstalks. It is possible that owing to the excessive rainfall during the late summer, followed by warm dry weather, certain molds were developed on the corn plant which caused the same trouble among horses that occurred during the late summer of 1912. Horses are peculiarly susceptible to molds whether on grain or forage.

Experiments at the Nebraska Agricultural College as well as in other states have shown that when fed moldy ear corn horses develop a fatal disease affecting the brain, commonly called blind staggers. Ear corn showing any signs of mold should not be fed to horses. Where shelled corn is fed it can be placed in a bucket and water poured over it. Stirring will bring the light moldy kernels to the top, when they can be poured off.

Warehouse Bill

Information from Washington indicates that the Lever warehouse bill has passed the house of representatives. The measure is a substitute for a senate bill which provided for cotton warehouses. The Lever bill contains provisions for both cotton and grain warehouses. The measure will now go to a conference committee between the senate and house. In discussing his bill, Representative Lever said:

"This bill will result in the establishment of a uniform warehouse receipts for agricultural products throughout the country. It will give a certainty and a value to warehouse receipts which they do not now possess. It will furnish to the farmers for the first time in this country the machinery through which he may be enabled not only to know the class or grade of his products but their commercial value."
