

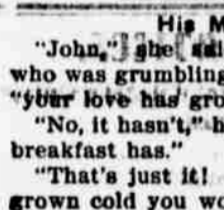

WITH THE LAWMAKERS

WHAT IS BEING DONE IN HALLS OF CONGRESS.

Epitome of the Work of the Daily Sessions of the National Lawmakers. Western Newspaper Union News Service, Saturday. The Senate—Republican opposition to the administration ship bill held the senate in continuous session.

Friday. The Senate—Resumed debate on ship purchase bill, Senator Norris urging amendments. The House—Began consideration of naval appropriation bill with agreement to conclude debate by 11 p. m.

Thursday. The Senate—Discussion of the administration ship bill continued. The House—President Wilson's veto of the immigration bill was received, read and referred to the immigration committee.

Wednesday. The Senate—Senator Gallinger continued speaking in opposition to the administration ship bill. The House—The senate bill for improvement of the public health service was debated.

Tuesday. The Senate—Met at 11 a. m. The administration shipping bill as revised by the senate caucus was reported by the commerce committee and debate on the measure proceeded.

Doane College Burns Canceled Bond. Crete, Neb.—Doane college had a great celebration here last week. At morning chapel President Allen announced the recent cancellation of \$10,000 in bonds.

Nebraskan World Champion. Lincoln, Neb.—Owen Daily, the Nebraska grappler, is again the lightweight champion wrestler of the world.

Getting Ready for Japanese Election. Tokio.—Energetic canvassing is already under way for the general election for the house of representatives which had been called by the emperor for March 25 following the dissolution of the house because of its refusal to approve the military program of the cabinet.

Bad Fire in Apartment House. Omaha, Neb.—The three families in the Argolis apartments were driven half clad into the thirteen-degree-below-zero temperature Thursday morning when a two-alarm fire for more than an hour seriously threatened the entire structure.

Embargo on Cattle, Sheep and Hogs. Chicago.—An embargo against the shipment of cattle, sheep or hogs from the Union stockyards has been ordered by the United States bureau of animal industry in an order to Dr. U. G. Vonck, chief veterinarian inspector of the bureau.

BRIEF NEWS OF NEBRASKA

Fairbury will be in the state baseball league next season. Dates for the Otoe county fair have been set for August 18 to 24. Wheat sold at Tecumseh, Thursday for \$1.35, the record market price.

Society women of the Hastings Y. W. C. A. have organized a bowling club. Farmers around Silver Creek have raised funds for an elevator at that place.

State manufacturers will hold their annual show at Lincoln, February 23 to 26. William Herbert, a pioneer of Omaha, is dead at that place at the age of 96 years.

Lincoln will hold her annual fiddlers' contest, open to the state, on the evening of February 4. Tecumseh ice men are harvesting their second crop of fifteen-inch ice. It is of splendid quality.

Nat W. Smalls was chosen as postmaster by the patrons of that office at a primary held last week. After a pastorate of nearly seven years at Steinmar, Rev. Father Fess has been transferred to Hebron.

Burglars entered the store of Bonebright & Bunte at Cortland and carried away goods valued at \$1,200. Lincoln has been invaded by the jitney car. It is said a number of them will be put on the streets at once.

Owing to an epidemic of measles at Elmwood, several rooms of the public school have been closed until it abates. Weeping Water W. C. T. U. has requested the school board at that place to have the Bible read in the public schools.

William Kuhn, of Blue Springs, aged 77, was stricken with apoplexy and fell dead in his yard while feeding chickens. Columbus will have a primary election February 9 to decide on a postmaster. There are five candidates for the place.

Charles Stahhut, former mayor of Nebraska City, and for many years a leading merchant of that place, is dead of apoplexy. Fairbury baseball fans have organized an association, and will put that town on the map by means of a state league team.

Chimes costing approximately \$10,000 will be furnished for the new \$65,000 Methodist church at Hastings by W. H. Lanning. State Field Veterinarian Day says the ravages of the corn stalk disease among horses are the worst in the history of Nebraska.
