**S. L. Rule Writes  
Of Boyhood Days**

Shullsburg, Wisconsin,  
March 29, 1915.  
Editor Red Cloud Chief:  
In looking over some old letters the other day, I came across one from my old friend, Henry Gilham, which I received nearly forty years ago, in which he mentioned some of his experiences, such as building shacks, fighting fires, etc., out on the Nebraska prairies—quite a change for Henry from a lucrative position in our high school, to starting from the stump in building a home out on the edge of civilization.  
From reading the news columns of the Red Cloud Chief, I can form a good idea of your bustling little city. Lean picture in fancy Red Cloud's broad business streets, her fine residences with autos lining the curb, ready for the owners to take a pleasure ride. I see your magnificent court house, but best and grandest of all is your High School and I am glad to know that you have selected the best man in your city as the president of your board of education.  
But fancy paints me another picture. The great blessing the present generation enjoys were purchased at the price of great privations for many of these pioneer settlers, like the Gilhams, Mrs. Bessie Richardson, who was formerly a Shullsburg girl, and many others, had come from homes of comfort to stand the rigors of a western climate in sod shacks, dugouts or other improvised homes, the chief mode of travel the slow ox team, almost entirely deprived of church and school privileges and struggling on year after year, always improving, always advancing, until on the once trackless prairies has arisen a beautiful city, a monument to the energy, thrift and high ideals of those sturdy sons of toil.  
Sometimes as I sit half dozing in my easy chair, I fall into a reminiscent mood. Memory carries me back to my boyhood days, when I roamed over these hills with the Gilham boys, or met with them in day school or Sunday school. Jim and I were in the same Sunday School class taught by his uncle, William Oates. We were a large class of boys and had arrived at the smart age when boys want to break away from all religious restraint but through the kindness, patience and tact of our teacher we were held in check. I truly believe that the influence of such a grand christian character has shone out for that class of boys as a beacon light in their voyage on life's troubled sea. Fifty years has changed that class of boys to old men, which suggests some lines of an old song—  
"A few more months, a few more years,  
It matters not, it won't be long.  
A few more sighs a few more tears,  
Will hush my song, my earthly song."

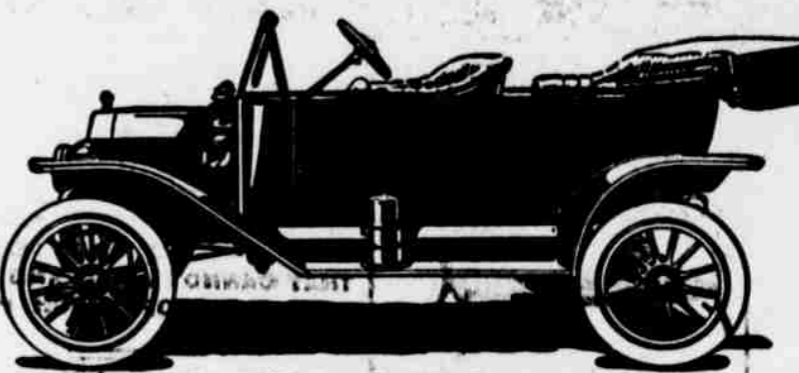
