County Commissioners Met On Tuesday

RED CLOUD, April 27, 1915: Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Members all present to wit: Floyd McCall Chairman of Board, Paul Storey, T. J. Chaplin, W. G. Hoffman and Grant Shidler. Report of special committee on road asked for by Fred Farner in Beaver Creek township:

We, your committee appointed to view said road beg to report that they have examined Fred Farner's real estate and find that the most practical road in the discretion of your committee for the petitioner is from the northwest corner of his said real estate and thence west 89 rods to the section line between sections 9 and 10, thence south forty feet, thence east eighty rods thence north forty feet to place of beginning said tract being the north forty feet of the southwest quarter of the northwest quarter of section 2, town 2, range 9.

We hereby appraise the land to be taken for said road at \$100 per acre or \$123 and that said amount be paid to Albert and Clara A. George as damages for said land; that any bridges that are necessary to be built on said road are to be built by said Farner and your committee hereby deems that said bridges will cost \$100 the expense of which together with the amount for the land as appraised shall be paid to the county treasurer before said road shall be opened or this order filed with the county clerk. GRANT SHIDLER, PAUL STOREY, W. G. HOFFMAN.

The foregoing report is adopted and the same is hereby made the order of the board.

Moved and seconded that two culverts be placed in section 7, township 1, range 12, located on the road running east and west in said section east from Franklin and Webster county line as follows: One 60 rods east of said Franklin and Webster county line and one 250 rods east of aforesaid Franklin and Webster county line and said culverts to be maintained by Webster county. Motion carried.

On motion the following claims were audited and allowed and clerk instructed to draw warrants on their respective funds in payment of same.
