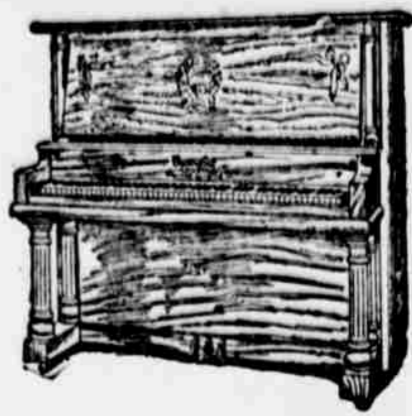
Spring Coats at \$5 and up at Miner's. The W. C. T. U. will meet with Mrs. Anna Rust on Wednesday, May 5th.

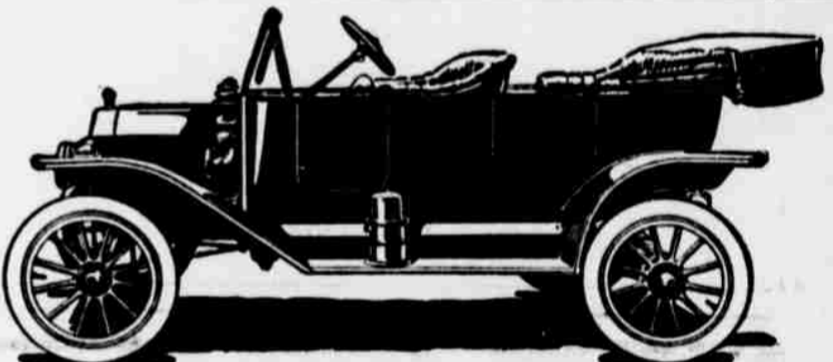
