Mr. Musselman is engaged in the mercantile business at Alma.

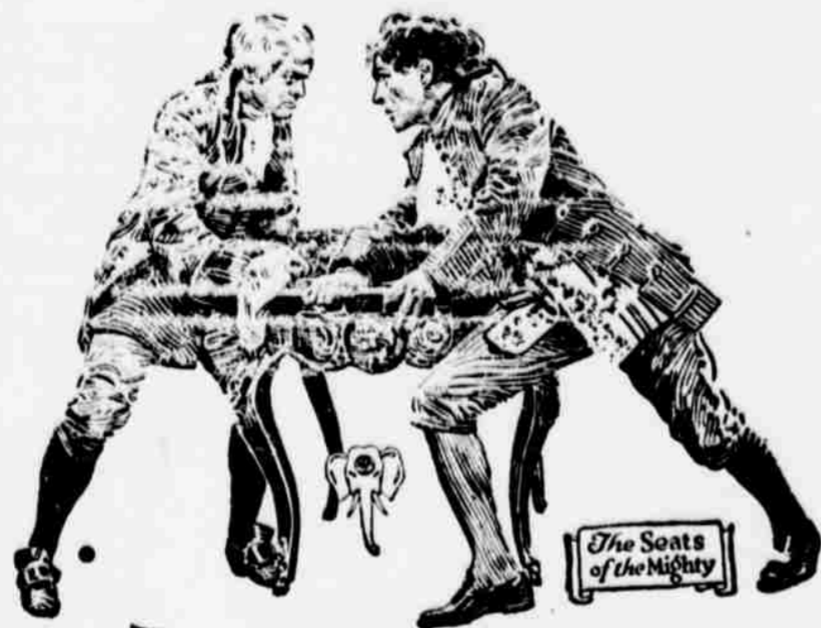

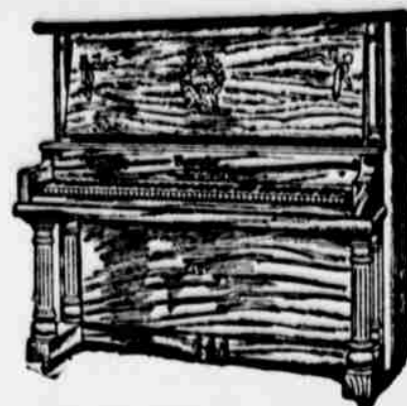

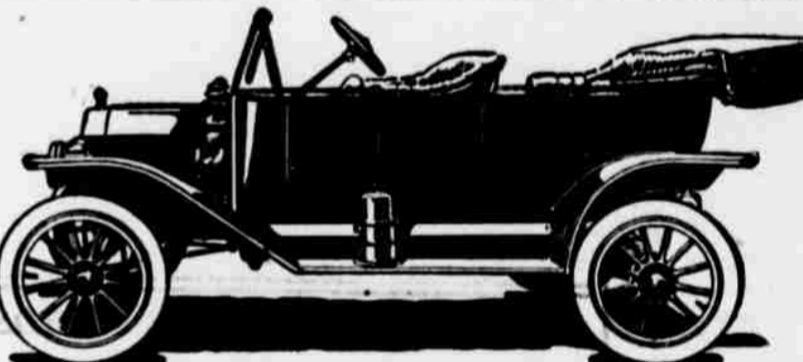
