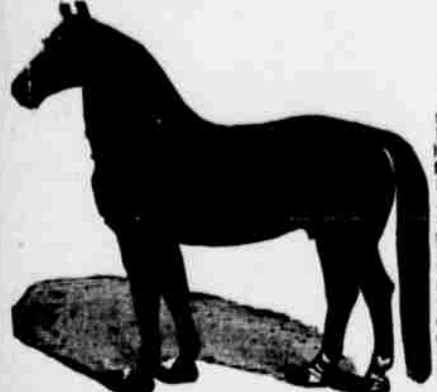

## The Standard Bred and Registered Trotting Stallion



### Allercyone McGregor

RECORD 2:09 1/4

ALLERCYONE MCGREGOR, No. 2989, the  
subject of this sketch, has a record of 2:09 1/4 on a  
half mile track in 1910. He is one of the stout,  
hearted, rugged-made, game race horses, and is  
from a race horse family on both sides of the  
house, being sired by Allercyone, he by the great  
Allerton, 2:09 1/4, his dam being the great broad  
mare, All McGregor, by Ben McGregor. His  
second dam is Maude McGregor, dam of Nut  
McGregor, 2:17 3/4, also the dam of Miss Belmont,  
the greatest race mare that ever raced over a  
half-mile track. Also the dam of many others  
with standard records. His third dam is the  
dam of six from 2:11 to 2:23, and with the fourth  
dam is a producer on his sire's side. Allercyone  
McGregor comes from the great Allerton family  
being by Allercyone the best son of the great  
Allerton, who in his time held the world's  
stallion record, 2:09 1/4 to high white colts, and was the leading sire of the world; on his  
dam's side the first three dams were McGregor mares, which family gave us the mighty  
Greens, who held the stallion record 2:07 1/4 for several years, and a family that has been  
considered the greatest race horse family in existence. Allercyone McGregor is a fine  
individual and a game race horse, having started 21 times and being first or second every  
time but twice. He was bred by E. H. Kroll, Carthage, Mo. In a race at Toledo, Ohio,  
Sept. 14, 1910, he beat as high class a field of 212 pacers as ever started over a half-mile track,  
the first heat being 2:07 1/4, equating the track record made by Mattie Chimes, the year be-  
fore. He won the heat pulled to a jog in the stretch, and it was said by all the horsemen  
present that he could have paced the heat in 2:08 or better. His record is no limit to his  
speed, as he has paced a half-mile on a half-mile track in 1:52 1/4, a quarter in 0:29, and an  
eighth in 0:11 1/4. While Allercyone McGregor is a pacer himself, he is strictly trotting  
bred, and what few colts he has are all trotters and show lots of speed, and he should be as  
great a sire as was his grandsire, if given an opportunity.

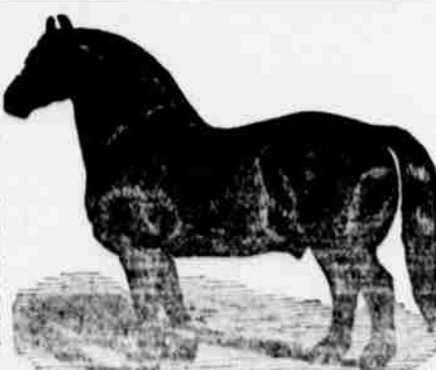

### Why Stay in Nebraska

The four leading agricultural crops  
of each of the states where the value  
exceeds one hundred million of dol-  
lars as compiled by the state board  
of agriculture from the figures of the  
U. S. Department of Agriculture show  
that corn, wheat, oats and hay make  
up the list from each state with the  
exception of Kansas and Nebraska  
where alfalfa displaces hay; in Texas  
and Oklahoma cotton is more valuable  
than hay; in Wisconsin barley is of  
greater value than wheat and tobacco  
was more valuable than oats in Ken-  
tucky.

The total values for the four leading  
crops obtained by the addition is as  
follows:

These figures show Nebraska second  
in per capita value figured on the  
rural population.

In analysis of the values as given  
by the first place occupant Kansas in  
comparison with Nebraska we find  
that Kansas values corn at 63 cents  
per bushel as against 53 in Nebraska,  
oats at 42 cents as against 40 here, and  
alfalfa at 88.00 as against 57.00 here.  
Wheat is figured at same price. If all  
the four crops had been the same price  
in both states the per capita Kansas  
valuation would have been \$2.29 as  
against Nebraska's \$2.35. Why should  
farmers leave Nebraska to better their  
condition?
