School Board Accepts Moritz's Resignation

RED CLOUD, May 17th. Adjourned meeting of the Board in the office of L. H. Blackledge. President Blackledge presiding. Members present—Blackledge, Coon, Weesner, Gilham and Pope. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved as read. Superintendent gave monthly report. Reported delinquent tuition fees of Maxon, also of Shuck; which by order of President Blackledge were referred to Finance Committee, who were instructed to make report at next regular meeting of the Board. Superintendent Moritz presented his resignation as Superintendent of the Red Cloud schools which after being read by the Secretary was submitted to the Board. Moved by Gilham and seconded by Coon that resignation be accepted. Motion carried. The Teachers Committee made the following report:

May 15, 1915. Teachers Committee met in Dr. Cross' office. All members present and have their report to make. To fill the vacancy of English teacher Miss Elizabeth Holmes of Boone, Iowa received three votes at the salary of \$65.00 per month. For Superintendent we recommend P. M. Whitehead of Gothenburg at \$1600 per year.

HENRY GILHAM, Chairman, C. E. CROSS, C. J. POPE.

Board proceeded to ballot for Superintendent, Mr. Whitehead receiving the vote of all members present and was declared elected. On motion his salary was fixed at \$1600 per year and the secretary was instructed to notify to this effect. On motion Miss Holmes was elected teacher of English at a salary of \$65 per month. Miss Holmes received five votes, Miss Farly one. The following bills were presented: Hansen Laundry.....\$ 3 35 American Book Co..... 23 00

Moved and seconded that the above claims be allowed. Motion carried. The following Committee assignments were made by President Blackledge:

Buildings and Grounds—Chairman Coon, Gilham and Cross. Claims—Chairman Weesner, Pope and Cross. Text Books and Supplies—Chairman Cross, Coon and Gilham. Finance—Chairman Pope, Weesner and Coon. Teachers—Chairman Gilham, Cross and Pope. Discipline—Chairman Coon, Weesner and Gilham. Moved and seconded to adjourn. Motion carried.

Weekly Weather Forecast
