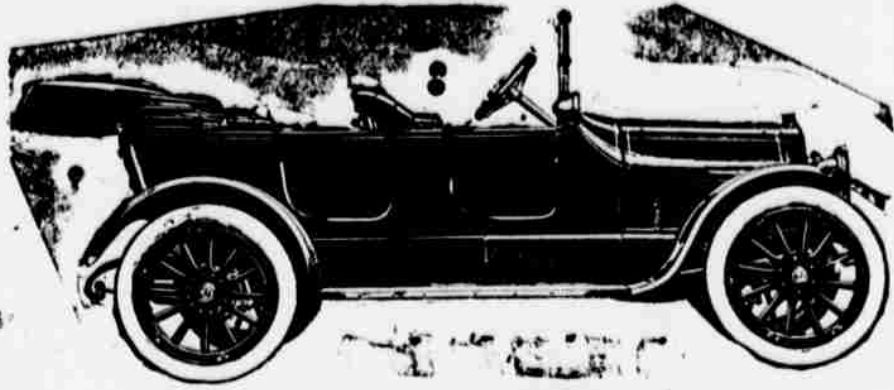

**Memorial Day Is  
Fittingly Observed**

Memorial Day services were held at the opera house on Sunday morning. A united choir from the various churches furnished the music. Rev. Myers of the Methodist church made the invocation, after which Rev. Hummel delivered a real good sermon, in keeping with the occasion, and which was enjoyed by the large audience present.

On Monday, Decoration Day was fittingly observed by all. In compliance with the Mayor's proclamation, the business houses were all closed from one until four o'clock. The day was an ideal one, the city was appropriately decorated with flags and bunting, and at 1 o'clock, with the Red Cloud Concert Band playing on the corner of Fourth Avenue and Webster street, the members of the G. A. R. and W. R. C. were comfortably seated in automobiles and conveyed to the cemetery, where the graves of the departed members of these organizations were decorated. The automobiles were furnished by our citizens, who are entitled to much praise for their liberality. The boy scouts, headed by John Boehr, marched to the cemetery.

**City Council Holds  
Regular Meeting**

Red Cloud, June 1, 1915  
The City Council met on Tuesday evening in a convened session in the office of Supt. Zeigler, with Mayor Damerell and all members of the council present.  
Minutes of meeting of May 4th read and approved.  
The monthly report of City Treasurer Fiorance was read and ordered placed on file.  
The owners of property were ordered to construct side walks on south side, blocks 4 and 5, and the west side, block 14, all in Smith and Moore's add to Red Cloud also on the west side of Walnut St. opposite the intersection of 1st. Ave. and Ave. "A".  
The return of Grant Christie City Marshall on serving sidewalk notices were read and ordered filed.  
City Clerk and City Engineer were instructed to prepare and advertise for bids for side walk on west end lots, 12 to 22 inclusive Block 1. Highland and Welsh add to Red Cloud.  
The application and bond of J. A. Tomilson for license to do electrical wiring was presented and approved.
