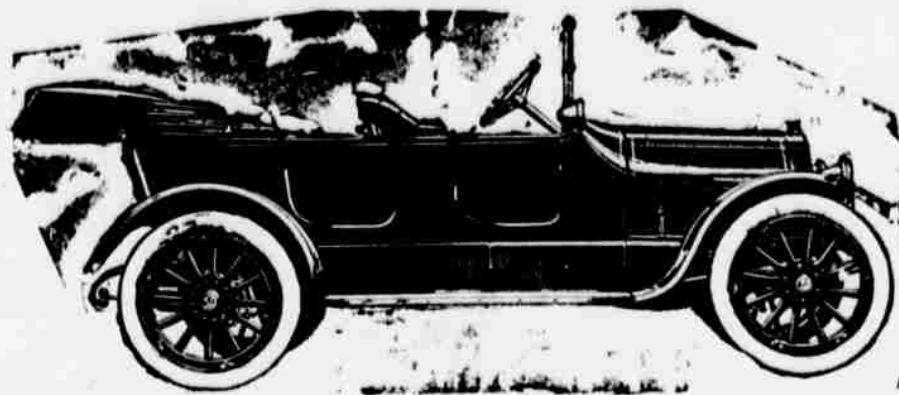

**County Commissioners  
Met On Tuesday**

Red Cloud, June 15, 1915.

Board of County Commissioner's met at call of the Clerk. Members present, Chaplin, Hoffman, Shidler, Story and McCall Chairman of Board.

Bridge Committee reported that it was necessary to build bridge one mile north of Cowles. Committee recommended that a 50 foot pin cemented 4 panel steel bridge with road way 16 feet, steel piling, concrete backing, and concrete floor, be built between Sec. 33 and 34 3 10. Bridge to be built according to State Engineer's plans on file with the County Clerk.

On motion recommendation of the committee to be order of this board. Carried.

On motion County Clerk was directed to advertise for sealed bids for the above bridge.

Commissioner Hoffman asked for bridge or repairs on bridge on line between Sections 12 and 13 Town Three Range Eleven.

On motion Hoffman was instructed to repair said bridge.

Official bond of Lee DeTour as overseer of Road-District No. one was approved.

On recommendation C. M. Wilson was appointed overseer of road District No. 15.

Teachers' Institute**

The Webster County Institute closed Friday, June 11. The regular instructors, Miss Florer for primary, play ground and rural school, and Mr. Harris for penmanship and drawing did exceptionally good work. Besides the regular instructors, Prof. Boehr gave some excellent help in the teaching of agriculture and the conducting of field trips. Dr. Driggs and Prof. Searson, both men of national reputation and authors, in the short time that they were here, outlined very clearly and distinctly, effective methods of teaching English, reading, civics and current events. The work done by these instructors has stamped the teaching work of the county high school, grade and rural, with methods and ideals distinctively progressive.

The closing lecture was given by Prof. Searson on the "Recreational Guidance of the Teacher." He showed that the teacher needs recreation, that it is important to select the recreation that will leave the teacher feeling better in every way and make her of greater value to the community.

The auto ride planned by the business men could not be carried out on account of the bad roads. The county superintendent and teachers were pleased with the spirit shown by the business men in planning the trip.

The Teachers' Institute this year was a complete success, from every viewpoint, and our able County Superintendent, Gertrude L. Coon, is to be congratulated for making it the same.
