Mrs. Hines has been selected as the delegate to the Home Missionary society convention to be held at York June 26-29, 1915.

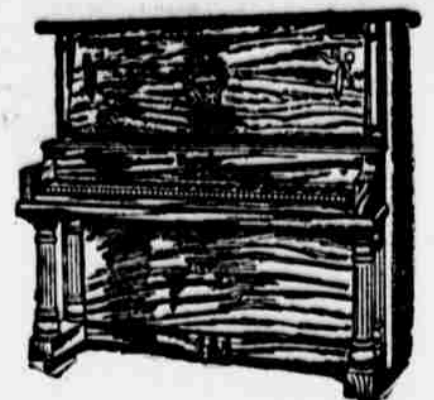
Two new members were received in the intermediate league Sunday evening. Children over 12 of about are urged to unite with the society.
