The M. E. Ladies Aid met Wednesday at Mrs. Wonderly's. Mrs. Wonderly's division served lunch to about thirty-five.

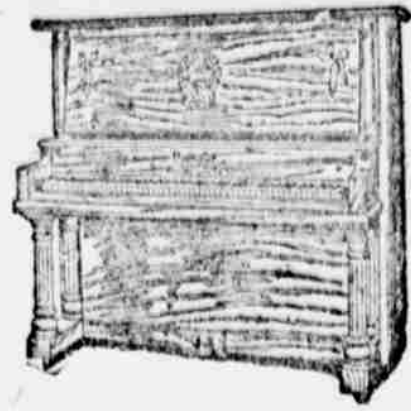
The business men of Invale went out Tuesday afternoon and cut the weeds around town. We hope they improved the looks of the town.
