Taxpayers To Vote On School Bonds

The Board of Education has decided to submit the question of issuing bonds to the amount of thirty-five thousand dollars to the voters of the district for the purpose of erecting a new modern high school building. The election will take place September 8, 1915. The problem of high school facilities has been before the various boards for the past ten years. Many makeshifts have been resorted to but the question has never been settled. The Chief believes that the action of the board will meet with the sanction of a majority of the voters of the district. This method is the most economical of any that has been presented. School efficiency requires adaquate facilities. With a new high school building Red Cloud will be second to no city in the state. Her schools have already established an excellent reputation for turning out high grade students and it is to our best interests to keep these schools up to standard.
