Owen Daily Wins From Young Russell

On Friday evening in the Newhouse building another wrestling match was pulled off. The preliminaries were first on the program. Mr. Stake, of Lincoln, taking on three of our home boys. He threw Allan Blackledge first in 2 1/2 minutes, Paul Poinicky in 4 minutes, then along came Red Cloud's future hope in the heavy weight class, Vernon Zeiss, who threw Mr. Stake in 10 minutes. This last match was very interesting, and the crowd was loud in their praises for Vernon. Two young boys, Dale Turner and Wallace Saladen, then put on the last preliminary, the former winning the match and also breaking Wallace's big toe, which causes him to be on crutches this week.

The main feature of the evening was the handicap match between Young Russell, who formerly held the welter weight championship of the world, and Owen Daily, who now holds the light weight championship of the world. Chief Montour was the referee and announced the wrestlers as they taken their places. The agreement, announced by the referee, was that Russell was to throw Daily twice in an hour. Roy Oatman was chosen as timekeeper. The wrestlers, both of whom were at their best, then began, amid loud applause by the large audience present. The tussle lasted one hour, during which at no time was Russell able to gain a good hold on Daily which the latter could not break. Both of the wrestlers put on a clean match, and Daily was declared the winner when time was called.

Young Russell, who has participated in several matches here in the past few weeks, has gained a large following of admirers. Owen Daily, who made his first appearance here that evening, made many friends all of whom would like to see him return here in the near future and put on another match. The largest crowd that has ever attended one of these matches, was present Friday evening, and all were of the opinion that they had secured their money's worth. If present plans materialize some of the best matches held in the state, are to be pulled off here this fall and winter.
