Red Cloud Boys Defeat Hebron Team

After several warm and profitable games the coaching of Coach Med for the High School football team journeyed to Hebron last Friday and played the Hebron blue school eleven in the opening game of the season; defeating them by the score of 13 to 7.

The local team played the entire game in Hebron's territory and the game was never in danger.

The game started with Hebron kicking to Red Cloud and on a series of plays and a thirty yard gain Polinsky scored the pigskin on a first tough down in less than two minutes of play Polinsky failing to kick goal, score 6 to 0.

In the second quarter Red Cloud kicking the Hebron fumbled and Kidd of Red Cloud recovered the ball on Hebron's goal line scoring a touchdown Polinsky failing at goal, score 12 to 0.

The second half opened with Red Cloud kicking to Hebron who by a series of false and crisp crosses scored a touchdown and kicked goal, score 12 to 7.

Polinsky later in the quarter from the 33 yard line made a beautiful drop kick making final score of 15 to 7. The sturdy Hebronites played a stellar game but were not in class with the locals. The locals played a steady and consistent game in which the lack of speed was a prominent factor, keeping the score down. Red Cloud completed four forward passes out of six tried, Hebron completing only two out of 8.
