Mrs. C. E. Joyce attended the household duties at Central while her mother, Mrs. S. E. Holdrege was absent.

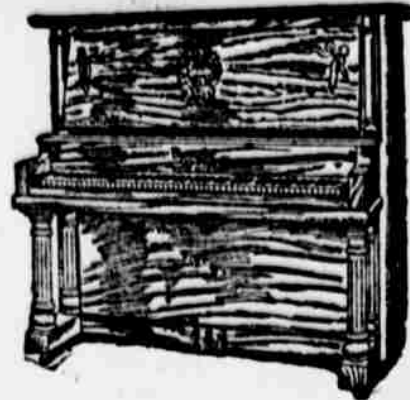
Mrs. Dunn and Mrs. Clifford Lovejoy went to Red Cloud Tuesday.
