The bride is a graduate of the Red Cloud High School and afterwards from the Chicago Conservatory of Music, and besides her many other accomplishments, is a musician of much ability. Besides being one of this city's most charming and popular young ladies, she comes from a family who for years have controlled large financial interests in this community, and who have done much toward the placing of Webster county in the front ranks.

The groom is engaged in the insurance brokerage business in Chicago, and while he is comparatively a stranger to the people of this city, he comes from an old and highly respected family, and no doubt is worthy the lady of his choice.

Death Removes Another Pioneer

August Cook was born in Germany, July 11, 1827. He resided in his native country until he was a young man, when he came to America, where he thought he could find a better opportunity to follow his chosen profession of shoemaker. He spent several years in Iowa, and finally in 1879 moved to Red Cloud, where he has since resided. More than twenty years of the time in this city was spent in the mercantile and shoe business. He was a pioneer citizen and did much to make Red Cloud and community the pride of the country. He was sober, industrious and honest in his relations and business life with the public. He was a member of the Lutheran church in Germany and never changed his church relations in America. He was ill only a few days and passed out of this life October 30th. His mind was keen and active to the last, and he was anxious for the success of his fatherland.

Mr. Cook leaves a wife, one son and two daughters to whom the sympathy of the entire community is extended. Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon by Rev. J. L. Beebe. Interment was made in the city cemetery.
