Beaver City Boys Play Fast Game

On last Friday the local high school football team journeyed to Beaver City where they played that team, losing by a score of 12 to 3. Red Cloud was handicapped by the loss of two regulars, Pope and Baker, who could not play on account of studies. Red Cloud kicked off to Beaver City who returned 15 yards and were held for downs. Red Cloud made 35 yards on downs and then on a 49 yard plunge thru line barely lost a touchdown on a fumble. Red Cloud loses ball on downs and Beaver City pointed on first down. First half was scoreless and teams played about evenly.

Second half opened with Red Cloud receiving and returning the ball 60 yards. On series of plays ball is carried to Beaver City's 20 yard line where dropkick fails. Ball is Beaver City's on 25 yard line. Red Cloud recovers ball on a fumble and carries ball over a touchdown. Newhouse fumbling the ball over the line. Beaver City recovers ball on 20 yard line and Red Cloud carries ball back to 25 yard line, where Polniak scored on a drop kick.

Beaver City scored two touchdowns in last quarter on a series of forward passes and line plays, failing at goals on both, being greatly helped by the innumerable fumbles by Red Cloud, who fumbled the ball at most disastrous times. Kidd, Ryan and Polniak starred for Red Cloud. Beaver City has been challenged for a game here during the Farmers' Institute, but will probably not accept. The locals think with their regular line-up they would change the score of last week. Beaver City played good, clean ball and treated the boys in a fine manner.
