According to tabulations made by the Nebraska State Board of Agriculture, there are more owners of farms occupying the land this year than at any time in the history of the state. More than 73,000 farm owners are residing on their farms, according to the Nebraska assessors. Last year the number reported was 65,221. In 1912 the number of farm owners aggregated 72,448. This stood as a record until 1915.
