According to figures tabulated by the Nebraska State Board of Agriculture the 1915 potato crop totaled 10,490,610 bushels. The acreage was 97,284 and the average yield 107.5 bushels per acre.

One of the saddest accidents that we have had to make note of for some time past, occurred last week, when Mrs. J. O. Lindley, while out in the back yard, at her home in this city, slipped and fell in such a manner as to fracture her right hip at the joint.

Owing to the lady's advanced age, and the fact of being naturally frail physically, grave doubts are entertained regarding her complete recovery.

The two gentlemen, John Phifer and Clarence Earl, who were taken in custody by Sheriff Hedge last spring, after a shooting affray at a "cat wagon" on the outskirts of Guide Rock, were this week sentenced by Federal Judge Munger of Omaha on a white slave charge.

Phifer drew six months in the Adams county jail while Earl was given a year and three months in the Federal penitentiary at Leavenworth.

The largest engine in the exhibit of the Baldwin Locomotive Works at the San Francisco Exposition, which was awarded the Grand Prize, was the Burlington's engine No. 6110. This is the largest road engine of the non-articulated type ever built. It weighs nearly 300 tons, is almost 84 feet long and carries 17 tons of coal and 10,000 gallons of water. Its fire box is as large as a homestead shack and the inside diameter of the front end of the boiler is 7 feet 4 inches. It took 37 days to get this engine across the continent from Philadelphia to San Francisco. A number of engines of this type are already in service on the Burlington lines.
