**Lincoln Letter**

Secretary O. E. Bernecker of the state board of equalization and assessment has sent out a notice of the annual meeting of county assessors, to be held in the senate chamber, Lincoln, January 19 and 20, 1916. County clerks and members of the county boards are also invited to attend this meeting, which promises to be the most interesting and useful gathering of the kind in years. Land assessments will be made in 1916 and uniformity in valuations is the result Secretary Bernecker is striving for.

Dr. J. D. Case, inspector of the state board of health, announces that he has ready for distribution a new edition of "Rules and Regulations of the State Board of Health" covering quarantine, care and disinfection of contagious diseases, rules for reporting births and deaths, etc., revised and edited by Dr. H. B. Cummins, of Seward, secretary. This publication is free to all doctors, schools, and persons having to do with the care of the sick. Address, Dr. J. D. Case, State House, Lincoln.

Even county treasurers have sent in annual settlement statements to State Auditor Wm. H. Smith up to January 6th, but settlement has been made with only one—Foster S. Gamble of Stanton county. The other ten treasurers (of Adams, Box Butte, Fillmore, Furnas, Greeley, Hall, Howard, Knox, Richardson and York) will be settled with as promptly as possible, after they have made an additional statement showing balance of state funds on hand at end of each month in 1915, together with date and amount of each remittance. The statutory penalty will probably be exacted in all cases where treasurers refused to make monthly remittances.

Taking charge of the treasury on January 8, 1915, it required a day or two for Treasurer Hall to get his bearings, but about the 12th of January he announced that thereafter all state warrants would be paid on presentation, and no more would be registered if it could be avoided. On January 12, 1915, there were outstanding \$863,000 of general, university and normal warrants—all drawing 4 percent interest. From that day to this, except one small lot of university warrants none have been registered. Less than 3 months after taking charge, all the registered warrants were disposed of as an interest liability against the state, and every state warrant is now at par.

**TELLS WHEN STORM IS NEAR**

Electric Companies Have Arrangement Which Warns Them When Extra Light is Needed.

When a heavy storm comes up in the daytime and the sky gets dark we all turn on the electric light. Sometimes this happens so suddenly that the companies which supply the electric current are taken unawares with only the normal daytime current that is entirely inadequate to meet a general demand.

Hence electric companies have to keep a man with a keen weather eye constantly "on the job." One of the largest concerns in New York has recently installed a storm detector similar to a wireless telegraph receiving apparatus, which is affected by neighboring thunderstorms and announces their presence by ringing a bell. The nearer the storm the more frequently does the bell ring, and within an hour to a half hour before the storm breaks there is ample warning to prepare additional generators for service when abnormal demands for current are felt.

Board of County Commissioners met in regular session. Members all present.

Meeting called to order by Clerk. Paul Storey was elected Chairman for the year 1916.

A saloon license was granted to A. F. Krouse of Rosemont and the bond filed and approved.

In the matter of bids for supplies for the various officers for the coming year. Bids were opened and upon investigation bids were rejected and officers directed to purchase such supplies as advertised for at prices not to exceed bids submitted.

On motion Tax List and Treasurer's Semi Annual Statement was let to the Commercial Advertiser and Blue Hill Leader at one half legal rate.

Application of Harriet Shuman for admission to Soldiers Home read and approved.

Report of Road Overseers of Districts No. 1, 6 1/2, 8, 12, 11, 2 and 2 1/2 were approved.

Low Abushon was appointed Road Overseer of district No. 9 to fill vacancy.

Resignation of E. R. Booth Road Overseer of district No. 2 1/2 was read and accepted. On motion Chris Guy was appointed to fill vacancy.

On motion County Treasurer was instructed to strike from tax list for the year 1915 the items of a mortgage given by Chas. Blobaum to Sophia Arends administratrix of estate of Wm. Arends for \$2000 and also note of \$125, the same being outlawed and declared worthless by County Judge.
