**A Nice Boquet** 


The following from the pen of Karl Spence, in his Franklin County News, is a nice boquet, indeed, and really makes us glad we are living:



Checks and currency in vauit ..... 19,015.31 Total balance ..... \$1,284,008.82 Taking charge of the treasury on January 8, 1915, it required a day or two for Treasurer Hall to get his bearings, but about the 12th of January he announced that thereafter all state warrants would be paid on presentation, and no more would be register ed if it could be avoided. On January 12. 1915, there were outstanding \$863,000 of general, university and normal war. rauts---ail drawing 4 percent interest. From that day to this, except one small lot of university warrants none have been registered.
