Week Marks Passing Of Four Citizens

Victor B. Fulton passed away at his home on Walnut Creek, Saturday, January 15th, aged 56 years, 1 month and 10 days. While it was known to a few that he was suffering from an incurable affection, still his death came with a shock to most of the people who were unaware of his ailment. He did his usual work the day before death summoned him.

Mr. Fulton was born December 5, 1859, and came to this county a lad of 13, with his parents in the year 1872. His father, Robert B. He was a member of the A. O. U. W. He served as bookkeeper and salesman for several of the business houses of the city. Modest and unassuming, he was yet steadfast in his faith and principles and exemplary in his conduct. His father was buried a few months ago, when near the age of eighty. Besides his three children he leaves an elder Brother, Willis.

Funeral services were conducted from the Baptist church on Tuesday afternoon, Rev. W. F. Cole assisted by Rev. G. W. Hummel and Clarence Eshelman officiating.
