Peterson has already secured the location and will begin removing the old buildings as soon as the weather permits. He will erect a one story brick building 50x140 feet, fully equipped with all modern appliances and conveniences. This will make a great improvement in that block. Several other building projects are under way and when the year closes it will go down into history as one of the biggest building years we have ever had.

Lincoln Letter

"Organized Agriculture" has filled Lincoln to overflowing with lumbermen, tax assessors, apple growers, stockmen, historians, dairy men, housekeepers, politicians and onlookers, all of whom seemed to deprive much benefit from the various meetings, January 17 to 31.

Upon application of Attorney General Willis E. Reed, the supreme court of Nebraska has granted a temporary injunction restraining five railroads from violating the two-cent fare law and the mileage book law. Hearing is set for February 7th on motion to make the injunction perpetual. This order covers all railroads in Nebraska, except the Missouri Pacific and Rock Island which had previously commenced suits in federal court to restrain the state officers from enforcing the rate law. The Missouri Pacific is now charging 2.4 cents per mile fare.

State Treasurer Geo. E. Hall has certified to State Superintendent Thomas that he has \$454,410.93 of temporary school money to be apportioned among the various school districts of Nebraska. This represents the collections from June 2, 1915, to January 17, 1916, and is made up as follows:

A most successful meeting of the county assessors of Nebraska was held in the senate chamber at Lincoln Wednesday and Thursday of last week and closed by re-electing D. L. Sylvester of Butler president and J. H. Dean of Buffalo Secretary. The legislative committee chosen comprises T. F. Costello of Hall, J. R. C. Miller of Lancaster and Fred Kluck of Colfax. Secretary O. E. Bernecker of the state board of assessment spent much of the time explaining puzzling questions that arise in the assessment of property. He said the state board expects counties to assess real property this spring at its true value. The manner in which a basis is to be found was explained. Assessors are to assess real estate at 75 percent of the sales value, only bona fide sales to be included. Addresses were made by State Treasurer George E. Hall and State Auditor W. H. Smith, members of the state board.

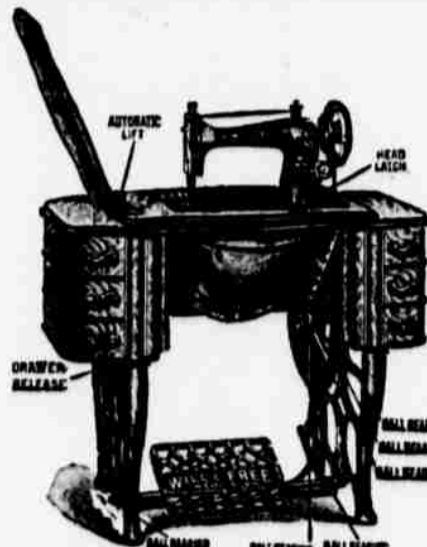
