Nebraska's And Omaha's Advantages To Be Told

Omaha, Neb., Jan. 25th.—A view booklet of Omaha and Nebraska is being prepared by the Bureau of Publicity for nation wide distribution during the year. The booklet, similar in general scheme to the one published two years ago, will contain an exhaustive review of the state and its various resources. It will also point out the opportunities existing in Nebraska cities for live wire business men who are looking for locations.

The Omaha part of the booklet will be general in character, giving the advantages which the city offers for business and home life. The main theme of the booklet, however, will be the opportunities in Nebraska.

A feature of the booklet will be the combined resources of the state in table form. When easterners realize that the value of crops from the soil in Nebraska during 1915, was \$223,000,000 and that the output was more than one hundred millions higher than the five year average, they will begin to appreciate the importance of Nebraska. The table shows the total resources of the state a trifle more than \$2,000,000,000, and the average farm production of more than \$2,500.

"RED CLOUD, NEB., Jan. 22.—To the Editor of The Bee: The democrats in this part of the state seem to be somewhat at sea as to the record of Senator Hitchcock during the last session of congress, viewed from the standpoint of what should constitute the record of a true democrat.
