Democrats Select Convention City

The Democratic State Committee which met at the Paxton hotel in Omaha on Friday, selected Hastings as the meeting place of the Democratic State Convention to be held on Tuesday, July 25th. All except seven of the members were present in person or by proxy, at the meeting Friday, and at this time Democratic electors were decided upon for five congressional districts, the first district not being ready with its selection. The list chosen is: Second district, Sophus Nebel, Omaha; Third district, B. M. Saunders, Niobrara; Fourth district, J. M. Woodard, Aurora; Fifth J. M. Teeling, Hastings; Sixth district, J. A. Donahue, O'Neill.

Franklin Secures New Depot

The C. R. & Q. has been directed by the Railway Commission to remodel and enlarge its depot at Franklin so as to approximately conform to the following specifications: One general waiting room, approximately 30x24 feet; one ladies' rest room, in connection with the general waiting room; these waiting rooms to be provided with modern sanitary toilet facilities; one office room, to conform to the ideas of the defendant, itself in regard to size and arrangement; one room for perishable freight and one freight room, not less than 24x14 feet, which is approximately the size of the present room. The order requires those improvements to be completed by the first of September.

Franklin Defeats O. D. D's

At four thirty Saturday afternoon, Feb. 12th, seven members of the O. D. D. club journeyed to Franklin, via automobile, to meet the High School of that place on the Basket Ball floor. A large number of representatives from the Academy, High School and city were present to witness the game which started at 9:05. At the very outset the Franklin bunch started rapid fire on the baskets and a good many times they hit the mark. From all appearance the club had had all of their pep jarred out of them on the way up. Notwithstanding the fact that the O. D. D's have never indulged in much practice they made an excellent showing both in team work and goal shooting. Franklin won by a score of 33 to 16 due largely to well operated team work and many horse shoes in goal shooting together with a well trained eye.

A New Picture Theatre

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cassill arrived in the city Wednesday from Alma. Mr. Cassill has leased the Newhouse building next door to The Chief office and this morning a force of carpenters began work remodeling the room preparatory to the opening of a modern picture theatre. Mr. Cassill informs us that he intends to also install a stage so that the room may be used for road shows as well. His plans call for a modern equipped picture theater front, a raised floor and the room to have a seating capacity of a little over four hundred.
