Two More Citizens Are Laid At Rest

Mrs. John Wilson

Mrs. John Wilson passed away at her home in the first ward last Saturday morning, after an illness of about a year's duration. She was born in Morgan county, Ohio, January 25, 1854, and was married November 4, 1862 to John Wilson. They moved to Iowa, and in 1881 came to Nebraska, where they have since resided. Nine children were born to this family, three boys and six girls, two of the boys having preceded their mother in death. Mrs. Wilson was a true Christian character—generous, industrious and always willing to help those in need.

Funeral services were held at the Christian church, Monday afternoon, conducted by Rev. J. L. Beebe. Interment was made in the city cemetery. The sympathy of the entire community goes out to her aged mother, husband, seven children and other relatives, during their hour of sadness.

Harvey H. Dedrick

Harvey H. Dedrick passed away at his home in the south-west part of this city on Saturday evening, February 19, aged 63 years, 5 months and 27 days. He had been in unusually good health for the past several months until about a week ago, when he taken a severe cold, which rapidly developed into pneumonia, ending in his death, as related above, which came as a shock to the entire community.

Mr. Dedrick was born in Jackson county, Indiana, August 22, 1852, and was married in 1872 to Miss Melissa Millholland. To this union were born eight children, five of whom together with their mother survive him. The children are: William, Jesse, Harry, Mrs. Alice Fearn and Mrs. Grace Reed.

Mr. Dedrick had lived in Nebraska for the past forty-two years, the most of this time being spent in Webster county. He followed the occupation of a plasterer and was a skilled workman in his chosen line. He was a man of quiet, unassuming disposition, yet was a friend to all. Sober, industrious and a man who could be relied upon at all times to do that which he knew to be right, his death leaves a vacancy which will, indeed, be hard to fill. Funeral services were conducted from the home this afternoon in charge of Rev. J. L. Beebe and Rev. G. F. Hummel. Interment was made in the city cemetery.
