McCook Styles McNeny
"Silver Tongued" Orator

At two o'clock Saturday morning the jury returned a verdict in the District Court in the case of Wm. Jeffries and Martin B. Holland vs The German Fire Ins. Co., the National Fire Ins. Co., and the Glen Falls Ins. Co., in which the defendants were represented by Messrs. Rose & Wells, of the firm of Stout, Rose & Wells, of Omaha, Neb., and the plaintiffs were represented by Bernard McNeny of Red Cloud, the latter being the well known and commonly called "silver-tongued" attorney of that city.

The case involving the collection of \$7,000 insurance on the Burlington hotel building which was destroyed by fire at Red Cloud, about one year ago, was one of the most hotly contested cases that has been staged at McCook in many a day. The trial of this case began on Wednesday last and continued until Saturday afternoon.

The total amount of the verdict against the Insurance Companies was \$7,000, or the full amount asked by plaintiffs.

The principle features were the addresses to the jury of Mr. Rose on behalf of the defendants and that of Mr. McNeny on behalf of the plaintiffs. Principally McNeny's argument to the jury was one of the most forceful, convincing and fluent oratorical efforts that it has been McCook's pleasure to hear in many a day—Monday's McCook Gazette.
