Editorial Association Selects Able President

The Republican valley editorial association held its semi-annual meeting at Trenton, Monday, says the state Journal with thirty members present, representing the weekly papers from Nuckolls county west to the Colorado line. The forenoon session opened with an address of welcome by Taylor of Trenton and responses of J. H. Hammond of Cambridge and Karl L. Spence of Franklin. Clark Perkins, vice president of the state association responded for the association and described the proposed excursion to the Scottsbluff country.

The officers for the past year have been J. W. Hammond, president, Cambridge; A. L. Taylor, vice president, Trenton; Karl Spence, secretary and treasurer, Franklin.

In the new election W. D. Edson of Red Cloud was elected president; F. E. Holmes, Holtbrook, vice president; Karl Spence, Franklin, secretary and treasurer. Red Cloud was selected as the place for the meeting next fall. At noon the visiting members were entertained by Trenton citizens.

Committeemen for the different counties were elected as follows: Nuckolls, F. A. Scheringer; Webster, Harry Vaughn; Franklin, L. O. Matthews; Harlan, F. P. Shields; Furnas, W. H. Cox; Red Willow, C. W. Barnes; Hitchcock, O. W. Dewald; Dundy, E. J. Fitzgerald; Chase, M. H. Prall; Hayes, L. W. Enyart.

The afternoon was spent in a discussion of business questions following a report by a committee on a schedule of uniform rates to be charged for job work and advertising. It was a very interesting session in which all members took an active part.

In the evening a banquet was served by the Daughters of Rebekah at the new opera house, and there was a number of impromptu toasts. After the banquet the doors were opened to the public and many of the citizens attended to enjoy the program. There were short speeches by Judge A. L. Sutton, Silas R. Barton, F. P. Shields, T. E. Nordgren, G. S. Foxworthy and E. A. Harrison of Lincoln, and others. The meeting was voted one of the most pleasant and profitable ever held in the state.

City Council Holds Regular Meeting

The City Council met in regular session on Tuesday evening, Mayor Damerell presiding, with Aldermen Koontz, Saladen and Caldwell present. Alderman Perry having removed from the first ward he was not present.

Minutes of the meeting of February 1st were read and approved.

Floyd Turnure representing the Red Cloud Band, came before the Council and asked an appropriation of \$75.00, which was granted.

The report of S. R. Florance read and ordered placed on file.

C. H. Rust representing the Dry forces was present and asked that the "Wet" and "Dry" issue be presented to the voters at the April election, on a separate ticket. The Council granted the request.

Councilman Koontz introduced a Fire Ordinance which was approved and passed.

The Council designated the Council chambers in the 1st ward and the Fireman's Hall in the 2nd ward, as the places for holding the general election. They also selected the following clerks and judges to serve at this election: Judges, 1st Ward, Henry Wolfe, Ed. Putschner and Silas Fincher; 2nd Ward, Jay Pope, Ed. Garber and J. A. Burden; Clerks, 1st Ward, C. H. Rust and M. C. Sherman; 2nd Ward, W. G. Warren and E. G. Caldwell.

The claim of Geo. Clauson for \$30 being for unpaid salary in May 1914, was presented in itemized form. It was decided that the claim be allowed for \$30 and the clerk be instructed to (Continued on page 4)
