March 7th, 1916.

Poor farm committee submitted an inventory of the poor farm stock, etc. On motion the report was approved and placed on record.

On motion the appointment of F. L. Stokes, Deputy Assessor for Walnut Township was approved and the Clerk was ordered to send blank bond to said F. L. Stokes.

In the matter of error in levy on District 61. On motion County Treasurer was directed to refund to each taxpayer of said District No. 61, twelve mills on his tax, and to cut the said school tax not paid by said tax payers to thirteen mills. Carried.

The resignation of W. J. Meyer Road Overseer Dist. No. 12 1/2 Glenwood Township was accepted.

On motion, the polling place for Garfield Precinct was changed from school house in Dist. 25 to school house in Dist. 18. Carried.

On motion settlement with the Road Overseer Dist. 4 was approved, also settlement with the Road Overseer of Dist. 7.

On motion the following claims were audited and allowed and the County Clerk authorized and instructed to draw warrants in payment of same.
