**Two City Tickets  
Placed In The Field**

In response to a call issued by E. S. Garber, secretary of the Citizens' Convention, about one hundred citizens of the city of Red Cloud met at the court house on Monday evening, at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the various city offices.

Chairman Ranney called the meeting to order and was again selected as chairman for the ensuing year.

E. S. Garber was re-nominated secretary, but declined the honor and T. J. Diamond was chosen in his place.

While the meeting, as a whole, was of an entirely quiet nature, it being evident from the first that the candidates who were to be chosen, would meet with the approval of a majority, yet the honor of mayor, developed a little heat. In this respect Mayor Dr. Robt. Damerell had for his opponent Attorney F. E. Maurer and when the final count was made the Doctor won out by a margin of but three votes.

Clark Stevens also had for his opponent George Clauson, for the honor of councilman of the first ward, but was nominated by a neat majority.

City Clerk O. C. Teel, Treasurer S. R. Florance and Engineer G. H. Overing were re-nominated by acclamation and after the first vote was taken, the rules were suspended and W. G. Hamilton was declared the nominee for councilman of the second ward.

President of the Board of Education, Attorney L. H. Blackledge, was again nominated without opposition and C. A. Herrick was chosen to fill the vacancy which will be made by the expired term of Henry Gilham.
