Donald McCallum

Rev. G. W. Hummel was called to Guide Rock, Tuesday, to preach the funeral services for Donald McCallum, who passed away at that place on Sunday, aged about 85 years.
 Mr. McCallum and Emanuel Peters on April 19, 1870, after having spent some time in searching for a location, selected a place for settlement in the broad and fertile valley of the Republican on the north side near the mouth of Soap creek, this settlement afterwards being named Guide Rock.
 At the first regular election in the county which was held October 10, 1871, Mr. McCallum was elected surveyor. He has made his home in Guide Rock since 1870 and was well known and highly respected by almost everyone in the county. He leaves two children to mourn his death.
