TO REDUCE BAGGAGE RATES

Will Reduce Baggage Rates

The Rock Island railroad has agreed to comply with the request of the state railway commission to reduce its rates on excess baggage in Nebraska. Some of the officials of the road denied at first that it had increased such rates. They alleged that the charge had been 16 1/2 per cent of the passenger fare ever since 1907. This amounted, however, to a confession that an increase had been automatically made when the federal court allowed the company to increase its passenger fare from 2 cents to 3 cents a mile. When the 2-cent fare law went into effect in Nebraska the railroads were charging fixed rates for excess baggage. Then they changed to a percentage basis of the passenger fare. The Rock Island since that time has been charging 16 1/2 per cent of the passenger fare. This rate was not changed when the federal court recently permitted the Rock Island to increase its passenger fare in Nebraska, and the percentage basis of charging for excess baggage consequently caused an increase.

How Dry Ballot Will Appear.

After conferring with representatives of the Nebraska dry federation and receiving their approval, Attorney General Reed has certified to the secretary of state the title and wording for the prohibitory constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot next November. The law provides that initiated propositions shall be printed at the top of the ballot, preceding party circles.

Here is the way the proposition will show up on the ballot: "Proposed by initiative petition. Constitutional amendment prohibiting the manufacture, sale and keeping for sale or barter, malt, spirituous or vinous liquors."

Attorney General Reed, the state railway commission and Attorney J. A. C. Kennedy for the railroad company have agreed on Frank H. Gaines of Omaha, as referee to take testimony and make findings to the federal court in the Missouri Pacific 3-cent fare injunction suit. The federal court some time ago issued a temporary injunction enabling the railroad company to collect this rate from its patrons, and it is now doing so, except between competitive points, where it charges the same as other lines.

Distribution of Harvest Hands.

The state department of labor is sending out blanks to wheat raisers and those in a position to make a fairly accurate estimate of the condition of grain. These blanks are sent to each county in the state. Information is requested as to condition of grain as compared with last year during the month of June, the number of harvest field workers used last year, the probable number of extra men needed this year, the prevailing wage last year and the probable wage this year.

Treasurer Hall Defendant in Suit.

Food Commissioner Harman, whose department has charge of the inspection of weights and measures all over the state except in the larger cities, believes that, as a general thing, the measuring pumps by which oil firms sell gasoline to automobile owners and users give purchaser the full amount that he pays for. These pumps, says Harman, have been under inspection right along. Occasionally one is found that runs short measure, and in every such instance it is either corrected or condemned.

University Alumni Elects Officers

Frank H. Woodland, class of 1900, of Omaha, was elected president of the University of Nebraska alumni at its recent session held in Lincoln. He succeeds N. Z. Snell of Lincoln. Other officers elected were: Francis Gere, '88, Lincoln, vice-president. Leonard Flansburg, '04, Lincoln, treasurer. Annis Chaikin, Lincoln, secretary. Fred M. Hunter of Lincoln was re-elected alumni representative on the student athletic board.

Holds Serum Law Unconstitutional.

Because the hog cholera serum law passed by the legislature of 1915 tends to create a monopoly and because it prevents a farmer from treating his own hogs or a veterinarian from purchasing serum with which to treat hogs of those who employ him, the act has been declared unconstitutional and void in an opinion by the supreme court of Nebraska, announced Saturday.

This decision is given in the test suit from Douglas county, where C. C. Hall was fined \$50 and costs because he sold serum without first obtaining a federal license from the department of agriculture of a state permit from the live stock sanitary board, and without having given a bond for \$5,000 as required by the state law. Another count of the information alleged that the sale was unlawful because the bottle contained no price mark.

In construing the United States serum law, the opinion by Judge Hamer says it is apparent that government licenses are required, not by persons who may be engaged merely in the sale of serum, but by those manufacturing it. The Nebraska law, by limiting the sale of serum to those holding government licenses, is construed to give the manufacturers a monopoly on the business, and for that reason is declared to have the effect of fostering a monopoly.

Expenses Were Less This Year

In the first five months of 1916, the state government and institutions of Nebraska were administered for \$217,000 less than in the same period a year ago. The 1915 period included the outgo for legislative salaries and expenses, but does not account for all of the difference.

The policy pursued by state officials in holding down expenditures and giving the people the benefit in the way of reduced state taxes has cut down the disbursements of the state treasury about \$12,000 to \$15,000 per month, in addition to the money saved by not having a session of the legislature this year.

State Auditor Smith's statement for May shows that in that month this year the warrants issued by his office totaled \$370,481, while in May a year ago the amount was \$465,775, being a difference of \$85,000 in favor of this year.

For the first five months of 1915 the warrants issued came to a total of \$2,286,013. In the first five months of the current year, the outgo has been held down to \$2,069,340.

Chancellor Announces Awards

Chancellor Avery of the state university has made the annual announcement of awards for proficiency in scholarship as follows: Elections to Theta Kappa Nu, honorary legal scholarship fraternity, Guy C. Chambers, Sidney; Otto Perrin, Sargent; John Polk, Louisville; Raymond Smith, Lincoln.

Brigadier General John Pershing's gold medal for proficiency in military science was awarded to Major Archer L. Burnham, Stanton, of the cadet battalion.

W. J. Bryan's prize for essay on international relations was awarded to William H. Line, Diller.

Attorney General Reed has filed an answer in the supreme court to an application of the Standard Oil company and other oil companies for a writ of mandamus to require the state treasurer to permit the use of \$125,000 of fees in the treasury for the payment of expenses of the oil inspection department before newly collected fees are used for such expenses. The attorney general, representing State Treasurer Hall resists the application by alleging the fees have not been appropriated by the legislature for such use; that the state treasurer does not know what part of the \$125,000 was derived from oil inspection fees and what part from food, drug and dairy fees; that the food and oil commissioner has several thousand dollars of fees in his hands which will be sufficient to pay running expenses; that the companies have no legal right to maintain this action.

Rebuilding the Union Pacific bridge over the Loup river at St. Paul will enable joint use of the structure for railroad and wagon traffic, according to word reaching the state engineer.

The state game warden is conducting a campaign of law enforcement at Curtis, a western Nebraska town where the fishing is one of the chief attractions to both local and transient sportsmen. Special Game Warden C. D. Hayden has reported to Chief Game Warden Gust Rutenbeck the prosecution of twenty-five persons for violations of the game laws and the collection of a total of \$230 fines and costs imposed by justices of the peace. The expense of the prosecutions to the state was about \$3.

New Absorbent in Surgery. One medical outcome of the war is the discovery that sphagnum moss and the sawdust are excellent substitutes for absorbent cotton as dressings for wounds. The moss is the long-fibered kind commonly found in swampy places in this country that florists and nurserymen use for protecting the roots of plants during shipment. It takes up moisture better than absorbent cotton and does not grow sodden so quickly. Of course both the moss and the sawdust are sterilized before they are used for dressings.—Youth's Companion.
