Victor Wilson Addresses Voters.

Victor Wilson, Democratic candidate or Railway Commissioner, was in the ity, Friday morning and addressed he voters on the issues of the day. He said in part:

"The results of the April primary Nebraska were deeply interested in the railway commission. Mr. Clarke, the republican candidate, carried on-iy 25 out of #3 counties in the state, otwithstanding he had the advantage of a nine years' membership on the Commission, and he was nominated only with the aid of suspiciously heavy yote in Douglas county. The State Journal attributed the heavy vote cast against him-almost 70 per cent of the total, to public dissatisfaction with his work on the Commission. In he democratic party, I was the only one of the five candidates who critiised the commissions's record, and arried 19 out of the D3 countles

"And the people have need to be oncerned with the commission. Evryone has been led to believe that he Commission made a valuation of the railroads in this state-a duty the legislature of 1909 placed upon it. But it is a matter of record and not devied that this has not been done. except in the case of the C. M. & O road, owning 300 out over the 6,000 in the state. And this notwithstanding the fact that the Commission has expended over \$80,000 appropiated for hat purpose. The engineers employed by the commission to aid them in this work accepted the railway theory of appraisement, and made such extravagant valuations that the Commission did not dare adopt them, especially after the threat of Commissioner Hal to expose the valuations if they were adopted. As an illustration of the excessiveness of these valuations: the engineers valued the bare right-ofway of the roads without any improvments at an average of \$256, an here compared with the average value of the farm lands of the state at that time at \$42 an acre.
