### Our Candidates.

During our mad rush for social and financial standing in this world it would be well for us to stop and consider the manner in which the community shall be governed and also the qualifications of those who seek to fill the offices for the ensuing term. It is the duty of every voter of the county to do his part towards placing the offices in the hands of capable persons, and every voter should do his utmost to select the proper officials.

The first candidate on the democratic ticket for county office is Mr. B. F. Perry, candidate for county clerk. He has been a resident of this state since 1879, and has never asked the voters to place him in a public office. He has had many years' experience in the mercantile business, and has demonstrated his ability. He is qualified to handle this office in such a manner that will be satisfactory to all.

Our present county attorney, Mr. E. J. Munday, who seeks a second term, has carried out the duties of this office without fear or favor. Mr. A. V. Ducker, candidate for county treasurer on the democratic ticket, needs no introduction to the voters as he has been a resident of this community for a number of years and in all his dealings with the public, has shown himself to be a man among men, in both social and business affairs. ### HOW TO VOTE FOR JUDGE

#### What is the Non-Partisan Ticket?

So many questions have been asked in reference to the Non-partisan ticket, that I submit the following which answers the questions usually asked.

In 1913 the legislature enacted a law for the Non-partisan nomination and election of Judicial Officers. This includes all the judges of all the courts, Supreme, District and County.

The names of candidates for Judge are required to appear on a separate ballot, called the Non-partisan ballot. It will contain all the names of all the candidates for Judge. It will not contain the names of any candidate for any office except Judge.

There shall be no political or party designation of any candidate for Judge. The name of any candidate for Judge will not appear on the regular or general ballot at all.

A straight party vote for either party will not be a vote for any judge.

IN ORDER TO VOTE FOR JUDGE, when you go to the voting place the election officers should give you a Non-partisan ticket IN ADDITION TO the regular ballot. MARK A CROSS OPPOSITE THE NAME OF THE MAN YOU WISH TO VOTE FOR AS JUDGE. FOLD YOUR BALLOT SEPARATELY AND GIVE BOTH IT AND THE REGULAR BALLOT TO THE ELECTION OFFICER AT THE SAME TIME.

IN ORDER TO VOTE FOR JUDGE AT ALL YOU MUST VOTE ON THIS SEPARATE NON-PARTISAN TICKET. LOOK FOR MY NAME THERE!

# Shall We Discard Local Option and Adopt State Prohibition?

Under the existing Local Option Law, it lies within the power of the citizens of any community in Nebraska to adopt local prohibition for their own city, town, or village.

*In every community in this state absolute control over this question lies in the hands of the majority of the voters. No interference from the outside is possible; nothing can thwart the wishes of the majority in the city, town or village, with respect to the question of license or no license.*

Many communities in this state have availed themselves of the power granted to them under our Local Option Law, and have adopted local prohibition for their own community. Where there is a dominant LOCAL public sentiment in support of that policy, it is possible to make the no-license policy respected and obeyed.

*There are, on the other hand, many communities in this state where it is the opinion of the majority of the citizens that the license policy is better adapted to their own community. Where that is the prevailing sentiment, the community is permitted, under our existing Local Option Law, to license the sale of alcoholic beverages—subject of course to the provisions and restrictions of the general state law.*

*In neither case, is a policy forced on a community from without. The principle of Home Rule prevails!*

It is now proposed to substitute for this policy of local self-government, the policy of state-wide prohibition. This prohibition policy is not intended for the relief of communities in which the no-license policy already prevails, but is designed to FORCE such a policy on other communities against their will.

The result, as the experience of other states has abundantly established, would be disastrous in every city and town on which prohibition is forced. It means, where dominant local sentiment is opposed to prohibition, lax enforcement of the law, the dividing of such towns into bitterly hostile factions, the reign of the spy and of the informer, the rapid growth of crime—and in the end it means higher taxes.

Against the substitution of such a system for that under which Nebraska is now operating, everyone having the best interests of the people of this state at heart, should solemnly protest.
