A MAN OF HIGH HONOR AND WILL ENFORCE LAW.

NEVILLE IS HIS OWN BOSS

Courageous Enough and Capable of Enforcing the Amendment if Carried by the People.

Keith Neville is not a drinker or liquor, but is a teetotaler. He has reiterated in all his campaign utterances not only that he will enforce the amendment should the people declare for it, but he will favor and promote such legislation as its friends may ask to make it effective. Nobody has said, and nobody can say, that Keith Neville is not a man of his word, for his whole life proves otherwise. Keith Neville's pledge that he will, if elected, enforce the amendment if the people declare for it, and that he will aid in promoting such legislation as will make it effective, is the pledge of an honest man and may be relied upon. Any banker who knows Keith Neville would cash that pledge over the counter as readily as he would a government bond. Nobody is paying any part of Keith Neville's campaign expenses. No clique or interest is behind his candidacy except the democratic party. If elected, nobody will own him or be in position to dictate to him. He has no guerrilla snipers to reward. Nor is Keith Neville in the habit of taking his meals in a saloon when a dining room may be found in the same hotel. Perhaps if he had that habit he might conscientiously make a bid for the church vote, like Mr. Sutton did. And at the same time have Tom Dennison betting \$1,000 on his election.

Two Strong Men

Edgar Howard, candidate for Lieutenant governor, deserves election at the hands of the people. He is the best equipped man who has come forward for the job in many years, and a state government operated by Keith Neville and by him would meet the needs of the people.
