Each township would elect its own officers and every voter would take an active part in local government. Each township would vote its own road tax and the money of each would be spent on its own roads. The township would be the unit of government instead of the county. Each voter would know and feel the effect of his own vote on all local affairs.

At a meeting of the Council, held October 18, 1916. Moved by W. G. Hamilton that the proposition on the sewer bond which was submitted to the voters of Red Cloud, City, at a special election held on April 11th, 1916, be rescinded and the result of said election be annulled upon the condition that the sewer bonds be cancelled by the Mayor and Council of said city. Said proposition being as follows: That the Mayor and Council of the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska, be authorized to issue coupon bonds of said city in the sum of \$250,000 to be denominated sewer bonds of said City of Red Cloud, Nebraska, in denominations of \$5,000 each, payable to bearer and to become due 20 years after the date thereof but payable any time after the expiration of 5 years of the option of said city, bearing not to exceed 5 per cent annual interest and to be dated the day of their issuance, interest and principal payable to the office of the Treasurer of the State of Nebraska, said bonds to be sold at not less than par value with accrued interest and the proceeds there of used by the city for the construction and establishing of a system of sewerage in and for said city in accordance with the plans and specifications heretofore adopted and on file and at a cost not to exceed \$250,000.00. Shall the Mayor and Council of said city annually levy the necessary tax upon all the taxable property within said city, in addition to all other taxes, to pay the interest upon said bonds as the same becomes due and to furnish a sinking fund for the payment of the principal of said bonds.
