The officers and committees in charge are sparing neither time nor expense to have this ninth annual session surpass all others previously held.

The programs will be rendered in the Morhart Opera House. The horses, cattle and hogs will be exhibited in the Koontz barn. Poultry and farm produce in the Peterson building and Women's and educational exhibits in the State Bank Block Hall.

The following speakers have been secured for this occasion: November 15, Willis E. Reed, Attorney General; November 16, Dr. A. O. Thomas, State Superintendent, "Agriculture in Public Schools"; November 17, Prof. Leslie Sipple, Kearney Normal School, "The Tragedies and Triumphs of the Rural School."

In a local paper there has been several mis-statements made about the way I have conducted the county attorney's office. First: As to the Bense case where it was stated that I recommended a \$100.00 bond is untrue. Ask the county judge. Second: As to the Cary case. It was a matter of common knowledge that the confession was ruled out because the officers made him promises before I was county attorney. Third: As to extra mill levy in 1915. It was a mere oversight. Every commissioner as well as myself knew that there could not be a 16 mill levy. Nor did I so advise the board, nor is the board to blame, nor has the county paid anything to correct same. Fourth: As to the bootlegging cases. Criticism is made as to the fine assessed. Suffice to say that about \$380.00 was paid the county by bootleggers. Besides one defendant sent to jail. Why have expensive trials at county expense? Of the 23 complaints filed by me the U. S. government took four defendants and one forfeited bond and the rest were all fined, jailed, sent to the penitentiary or paroled, and about \$600.00 in fines and costs have been paid the county.
