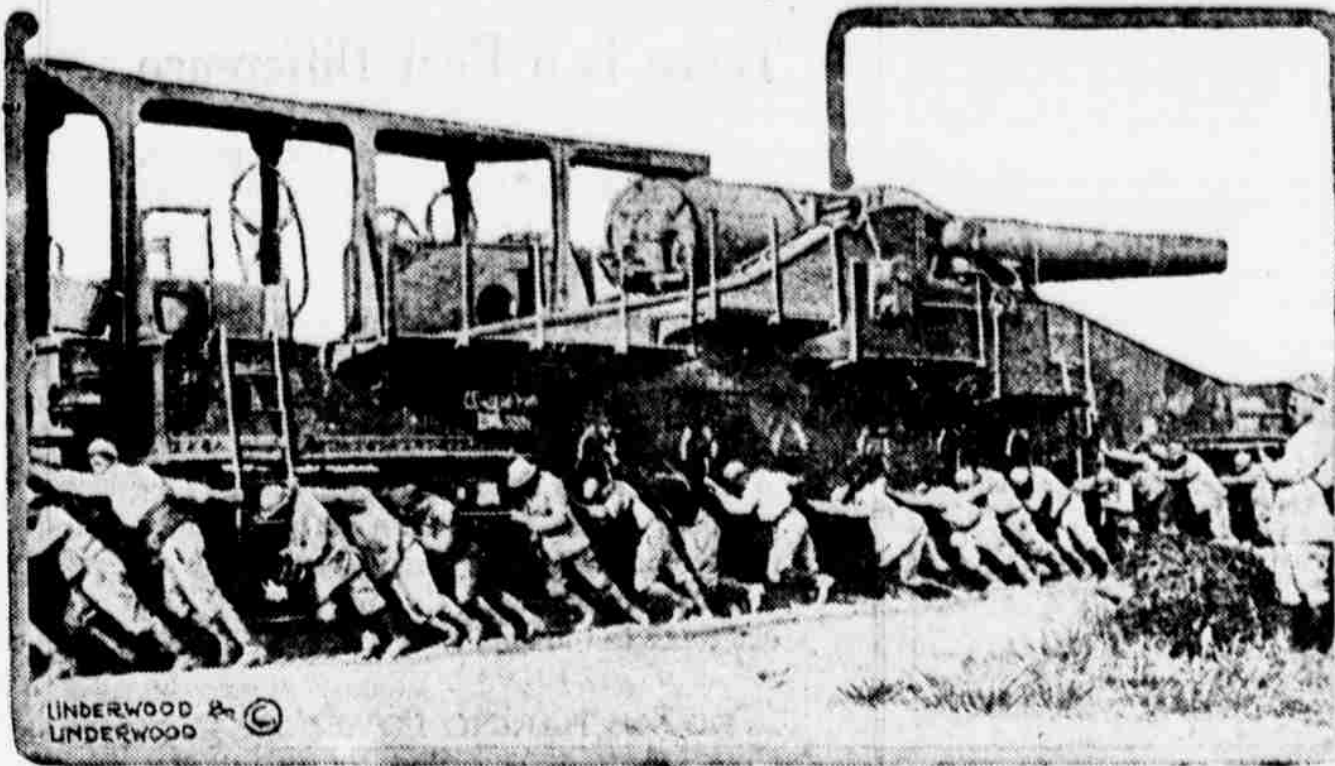


NEWEST AND BIGGEST FRENCH GUNS

What Did He Sing?

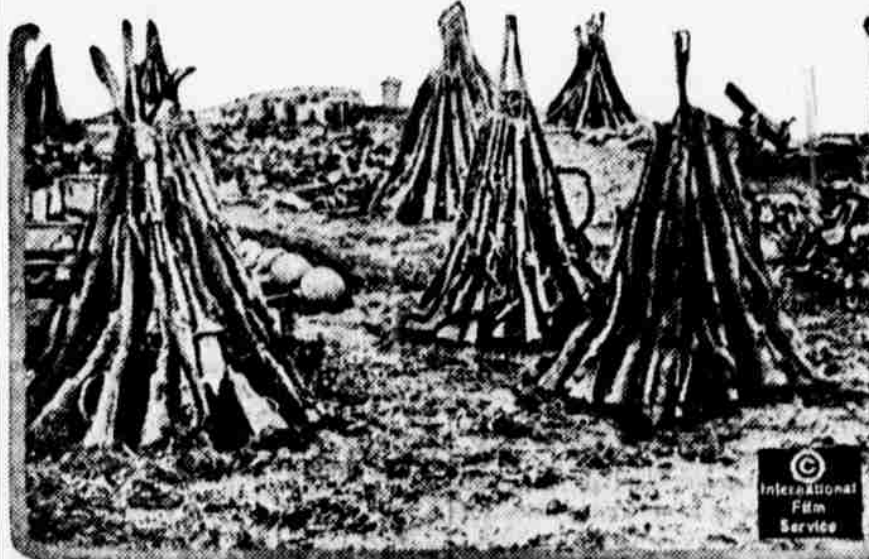

GO DOWN IN BATTLE

SHERIFF'S POSSE AND I. W. W.'S IN DESPERATE FIGHT HAS SET NEW HIGH RECORD

Resources of National Banks Have Passed Their Own Mark—Bandits Resort to Barbaric Methods.

Western Newspaper Union News Service. Everett, Wash.—At least five men were killed and forty injured Sunday in a pitched battle at the Everett city wharf between 250 members of the industrial workers of the world, who came here from Seattle on the steamer Verona, and a posse of 150 citizens headed by Sheriff Don McKee. Sheriff McKee is among the seriously wounded. After the shooting, in which about 1,000 shots were exchanged, the Verona turned around and started back to Seattle. Many men were seen to fall on the deck of the steamer and others, panic-stricken, jumped overboard. Some were taken from the water but others disappeared and it is believed they were drowned.

Barbarian Methods of Bandits El Paso. Villa bandits are cutting the ears from captured Carranza soldiers and then sending them back to their commands as a warning to other Carranza soldiers, said a Mexican civilian refugee who reached here from Jimenez, Chihuahua. He came to El Paso by way of Torreon, Coahuila, and from there to Eagle Pass, Tex., as the Mexican Central railroad was cut between Jimenez and Chihuahua City. He claimed to have seen sixteen Carranza soldiers at Jimenez with their ears severed from their heads.

SET NEW HIGH RECORD

Resources of National Banks Have Passed Their Own Mark Washington.—The resources of the national banks of the United States have passed their own highest mark again—boosting the previous high record of May 1 by \$216,000,000. Reports to the comptroller of the treasury, in response to the last bank call, show that resources September 12 totaled \$14,411,000,000. This is an increase of \$485,000,000 over the June 30 report and of \$2,144,000,000 over the September, 1915, report. Total deposits were \$11,362,000,000, which is \$227,000,000 more than ever shown before. It is more than two billion dollars above the total of a year ago.

Ames Lost to Cornhuskers.

Lincoln, Neb.—Nebraska won from Ames Saturday afternoon 3 to 0. The Cornhuskers failed to start anything except in flashes and they really were lucky to escape a tie game. Ames had a little better of the breaks in that penalties didn't go her way often and in that she had the wind to her back when it was absolutely necessary to punt. But the farmers played the game for all that was in them. The line was stubborn both on defense and offense and the Cornhuskers looked listless in comparison.

Russia to Establish Blacklist.

Petrograd.—A blacklist similar to the one in force in Great Britain and including the names of most of the foreign firms trading with enemies of Russia will soon be published by the ministry of trade and industry in accordance with a decision of the council of ministers, which needs only the signature of the emperor to become a law.

Greeks Sending Reinforcements.

London.—Reuter's Athens correspondent says the Greek government has sent reinforcements of infantry and artillery to Katerina. The correspondent adds that Admiral Du Poutet, commander of the allied fleet in the Mediterranean, has sent notice to the Greek harbor authorities indicating a danger zone for vessels entering or leaving Piraeus harbor.

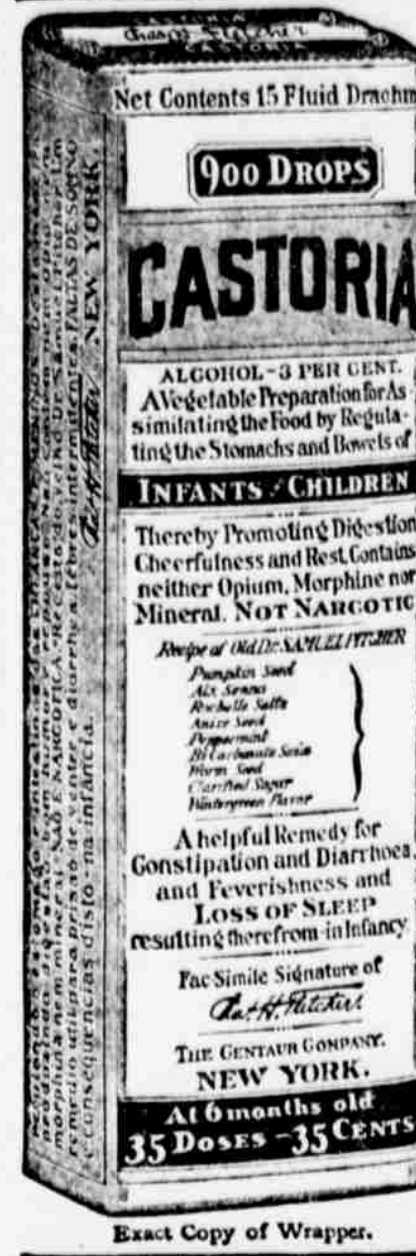
Marshfield, Ore.—Three dead and two injured was the result of a gas explosion which occurred 3,000 feet below the surface in the Beaver Hill coal mine near here. Only one body has been recovered, as black damp is impeding rescue work.

State Irrigation Meeting

Bridgeport, Neb.—The seventh annual convention of the Nebraska State Irrigation association will be held here December 6, 7 and 8, the Miller Opera house being the headquarters. Every irrigation canal will have at least one representative at the convention, if the invitations are accepted. The announcements say the executive committee October 5 outlined the program and made the convention plans. This is a "legislative year" and many amendments to the irrigation laws will be proposed.

Austrian Fatalities During Year

Geneva.—Austrians have lost 859,000 men since the beginning of the year, according to authoritative information of this number, 459,000 are prisoners in the hands of the Russians or Italians. When Rumania declared war, Austria had forty-six divisions on the Russian front, thirty-one on the Italian front and two in Serbia and Albania. From these forces she withdrew eighty-eight battalions to send against the Rumanians. This force was later augmented as fighting grew less violent on the Russian front.
