Kansas City Market

Kansas City Stock Yards, Nov. 4.—The strength shown in killing cattle last week held good today, and was strong to 15 higher, standards and feeders largely steady, receipts 25,000 cattle and 2,000 calves. Hogs sold for higher to order buyers but purchaser kept up their fight and refused to pay more than steady prices. Sheep and lambs sold steady.
BEEF CATTLE.—The prime steer market has not been tested for a week, but the right kind would sell to \$11.25. Short fed were the best here today, several sales at \$9.25 to \$9.95, medium kinds around \$8.50. Good weight Oklahoma and Kansas grass steers sold up to \$7.50 and Colorado beef steers weighers of cheap cattle to kill at their. The tendency is stronger on beef steers, which got the full advance today, as killers fear a drop in the supply within the next few weeks. Medium to good cows sold strong, at \$5.75 to \$7.00, canners in larger supply, but steady, at \$4.25 to \$4.85. Local packers have been shipping in large numbers 375 to 1000 head at \$7.50 to \$7.50 plants here, which they bought at lower prices than prevail here at St. Louis, Chicago and St. Paul.
STOCKERS AND FEEDERS.—The market closed off 25 cents last week, with a fair number held over. Best kinds sold steady today, strings of yearlings from the district around Hereford, Texas, selling at \$7.25 to \$7.75, some pretty good Colorado yearlings at \$7.15, medium yearlings at \$6.25 to \$6.75, feeders mostly at \$5.50 to \$7.75, fleshy feeders up to \$8.50. New Mexico yearling stock heifers at \$7.75, stock cows \$5.25 to \$5.50.
HOGS.—The market closed last week in a demoralized condition, but the opening today was strong, early sales 10 higher, top \$9.65, bulk of sales \$9.15 to \$9.00, receipts 11,000. Receipts were liberal at all points last week and packers saw a chance to begin their winter packing season on a reduced price basis, hence their stiff fight for lower prices. Whether or not this break will sink deep into the volume of receipts. Total supply at the five leading markets today is 78,000, compared with 101,000 last Monday, and if the country can keep up that kind of slaughter the receipts for a little while the market will no doubt regain recent losses.
LAMBS AND EWEES.—The supply of 7,000 head contained nothing choice, fair to good lambs selling at \$10.00 to \$11.00, with the added advantage to sellers that fills were good. A few native lambs sell up to \$11, and fat ewes are worth \$7 to \$7.50. A few short fed lambs are coming, not very fine finished, and selling at \$10.50 to \$10.75, money making prices for feeders. The first storm will bring in a good run out of corn fields, which might cause a temporary lull, hence it might be wise to ship before the first storm comes. Feeding lambs bring \$9.50 to \$9.75, choice light feeders up to \$10.
