Feature Play Friday Night

Farmers' Institute Is Now In Full Blast

The Webster County Farmers' Institute is now in session and it is being demonstrated that this is the best yet. Nine years ago this association was formed and as the years go by it has been increasing in popularity until now it is known as the best of its kind in the state. All the state workers tell the same story, that Red Cloud has the greatest Farmers' Institute in the state of Nebraska.

An array of willing workers has made this year's session a grand success. Everything is carefully and comfortably arranged so that the visitors have no difficulty in viewing the exhibits.

The greatest improvement over other years is to be found in the ladies' department and farm products department. The ladies have fairly outdone themselves in their effort to show the world what can be done for the home. Here you will find on display the very finest dishes that the imagination can conceive, cooked to a nicety and displayed to the very best advantage. One exhibit showed how the farmer could have fresh meat all summer by a new process of canning. Then there you will find bread like mother used to make, pies, cookies, tarts, cakes and a lot of other dishes that mere man hesitates to name.

In this department is to be found the school exhibits. A careful examination of the work of the school children will reveal a marked improvement over former years in writing and drawing. We counted fifty-one different varieties of wood gathered by one of the boys around the home place. This exhibition is a credit to the children, their teachers and the superintendent in charge.

On the whole the farm products department is far ahead of former years. The selection of all kinds of farm products shows either a better yield or else a better knowledge of what to select, perhaps it would be fair to say of both. The corn exhibit is simply excellent. You will find corn here as large as any raised in Iowa or Illinois and a quality that is excelled by none.

The Pumpkin contest resulted in some enormous vegetables that look like the ordinary kind magnified a dozen times. How any one can get these monsters to grow is indeed a great mystery to this editor but they are there and no mistake.

The cattle and sheep and hogs department is better than ever before and these animals bring forth unstinted praise. They are fine specimens and Webster county feels proud of them. The number of horses on exhibition is not so large as some years past but what this department lacks is quantity it makes up in quality.

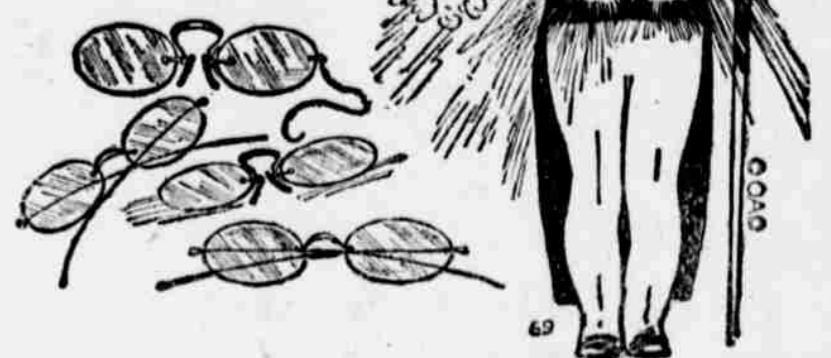
