The Webster County Farmers' Insti. tute is now in session and it is being demonstrated that this is the best yet. Nine years ago this association was formed and as the years go by it has been increasing in popularity until now it is known as the best of its kind in the state. All the state workers tell the same story, that Red Cloud has the greatest Farmers' Institute in the state of Nebraska.

An array of willing workers has made this year's session a grand success. Everything is carefully and comfortably arranged so that the visitexhibits.

The greatest improvement over other years is to be found in the ladies' department and farm products department. The ladies have fairly outdone themselves in their effort to show the world what can be done for the home.
