On Saturday of last week, one of the oldest mercantile establishments of the city, Miner Bros. Company, owned by Mr. W. F. Hipes of Chicago, Illinois, and Messrs. C. H. Miner and H. A. Letson of this city, closed its doors to the public, as a short time previous to this date, a deal had been made whereby the O. Cannady Mercantile Company of Holyoke, Colorado, became the owners of the stock. We are informed that the stock will be packed and shipped out of the city, to be disposed of by the Company purchasing it.

As it seems to have been the wish of the stockholders of the establishment to dispose of their holdings, their many friends and patrons will be pleased to know that they have been successful in doing so, nevertheless every one will regret, to a certain extent, the loss of this business institution, as it has been one of the old landmarks of the city, having been established some thirty five years ago, and during the entire time, it had catered to the public fair dealings and moderate prices have marked its progress.

McCook Defeats Red Cloud By a Score of 17 to 6

McCook won her second victory of the season Friday afternoon by defeating the fast Red Cloud aggregation to the tune of 17 to 6. The game was McCook's thout, altho Red Cloud was strong on the defense.

In the first quarter, McCook kicked to Red Cloud who returned the ball to their thirty yard line, then lost it on a fumble. McCook then took possession of the ball and went down the field with line plunges, Cliff Hegenberger going over for a touchdown and then kicking goal. McCook kicked to Red Cloud and this time the visitors returned the ball to the forty yard line and lost on downs. After two successful attempts to make gains thru Red Cloud by center rushes, Halfback Gatewood kicked a field goal from thirty yard line making the score 10 to 0.

In the second quarter, McCook swept the field in great offensive drives (war dops) tearing the Red's line assunder and taking trench after trench of the white chalk lines till Gatewood plunged over their barriers for another touchdown. With Hegenberger kicking goal, McCook advanced her score to 17 to 0.

McCook received the ball in the third quarter and returned for thirty yards losing on downs. Red Cloud punted out of bounds and McCook lost on a fumble. Red Cloud then played for heavy gains thru McCook's line and was successful in pushing the pig skin over for six points but failed to kick goal. During this part of the game, McCook's line seemed to weaken, especially the left side thru which most of the gains were made. The remainder of the battle was without sensational play consisting mostly of line bucks and a sea saw between the two sides. Hegenberger, T. Gatewood and V. Gatewood starred for the locals while Barrett of the visiting eleven deserves special mention—Red Willow County Gazette.
