City Council Holds An Adjourned Session

On Saturday morning at 10 o'clock Mayor Damerell called the Council together in regular adjourned session at the Council Chambers with members Koontz, Hamilton, Stevens and Saladen present.

The Council then proceeded to open bids for the sale of the \$20,000.00 sewer bonds the following submitting bids: Burns Brinkona & Co.; Cumming Prudden & Co.; C. H. Coffee; Halsey Stuart & Co.; H. C. Speer & Sons Co.; Lincoln Trust Co. by J. W. Auld; United States Trust Co. by Webster County Bank; Fidelity Trust Co.; Geo. M. Bechtel & Co.

It was then moved by Hamilton, seconded by Stevens that the bids be layed over until the bids are opened for contract on sewerage.

The matter of opening bids for the construction of sewerage under the \$20,000.00 bond issue was then taken up and the following bids found submitted: H. J. Peterson, Omaha, \$23,600; J. S. Rinehart, Hastings, \$20,982; Comstock & Hansan, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, \$23,522.65; M. A. Camery, Harlan, Iowa, \$22,300; A. A. Dobson, Lincoln, \$21,700; Geo. L. Vlasnek, Lincoln, \$22,400; Elkhorn Construction Co., Fremont, \$20,884.76; W. S. Scott, Lincoln, \$21,506.10; Inter Mountain Bridge & Construction Co., Tecumseh, \$22,250; Alfro Coniglia, Omaha, \$21,640.

Council then awarded the contract to the Elkhorn Construction Co. for the sum of \$20,884.76 they being the lowest bidders and the Engineer's estimate being \$22,400.

Council then decided that since the bid of J. W. Auld for the Lincoln Trust Co., for the \$20,000 bond issue for par and accrued plus \$50 carried with it the stipulation, that the bonds should be delivered in 5000 lots not later than October 1, 1917, was the best bid submitted consequently the motion that the same be sold to Mr. Auld was carried.
