
A. O. U. W. Will Raise Rates

Insurgency is brewing in the ranks Wm. H. Moore v Henry L'Heureux, of the A. O. U. W., following the action here of the Nebraska grand lodge in raising the insurance rates to conform to the schedule of the American Fra. ternal congress. Just as is the case of the Modern Woodmen of America, it is the older members who are most seriously affected. While this insurgency will reach the proportion of the M W. A. fight depends on how far down the line the increased rates are felt to be burdensome.
