C. W. Kaley Passes Away in California

The many friends of Charles W. Kaley were deeply grieved to learn of his death which occurred at the Angeles hospital, Los Angeles, California, at 9:00 P. M., Saturday, January 9th.

Charles William Kaley was born in Millin county, Pennsylvania, December 12, 1845. He was one of a family of twelve children, coming to Red Cloud in 1874. He was a graduate of Wittenburg college Springfield, Illinois and for a number of years was an instructor in public schools. In 1876 he was admitted to the bar and continued to practice law until 1896.

In 1879 he was elected county judge, in 1881 elected to the legislature and was appointed a member of the Normal Board, in 1893 he was elected regent of the State University and in 1894 was elected to the legislature.

He was a member of the Blue Lodge, Chapter, Noble of the Mystic Shrine, Past High Priest, Grand Master of the State, and King of the Grand Chapter of the Masonic lodge.

On December 23, 1879 he was united in marriage to Miss Cyrelia A. Widney who passed to her eternal reward April 15, 1901.

The deceased had traveled abroad and was well acquainted with the conditions of the world.

He was successful in business and won the respect of all who knew him. His advice was often sought by his fellow men; a man of culture and of a generous nature, having contributed liberally to the Masonic home at Plattsmouth; a republican in politics; an ideal landlord who was honored and respected by all his tenants; a man who had won for himself a large circle of social and business friends.

The remains will arrive in this city Friday morning. Funeral services will be conducted from the home of his brother, D. H. Kaley, on Sunday afternoon, Rev. J. L. Beebe assisted by Rev. G. W. Hummel, being in charge of the services. Interment will be made in the Red Cloud city cemetery.

A. O. U. W. Will Raise Rates

Insurgency is brewing in the ranks of the A. O. U. W., following the action here of the Nebraska grand lodge in raising the insurance rates to conform to the schedule of the American Fraternal congress. Just as is the case of the Modern Woodmen of America, it is the older members who are most seriously affected. While this insurgency will reach the proportion of the M. W. A. fight depends on how far down the line the increased rates are felt to be burdensome.

Discussing the increase yesterday, a good many of the old men felt that a fight would be useless, and that the only thing left for them to do is to drop out of the organization and lose the benefit of the premiums they have been paying for years.

One man who will be 64 when the new rates go into effect in May finds his premium increased from \$3.65 a month to \$11.20 a month for \$2,000. Another whose rate has been \$3.45 will have to pay \$9.45 a month. The effect on the younger men will be as follows: a man 21 years old will pay \$1.40 per month on \$1,500 and \$1.83 on \$2,000; A man 25 years old will pay \$1.56 on \$1,500 and \$2.08 on \$2,000; a man 30 years old will pay \$1.22 on \$1,000, \$1.33 on \$1,500 and \$2.44 for \$2,000; a man at 35 years of age will pay \$1.40 per \$1,000 and \$2.80 for \$2,000; a man 40 years old will pay \$1.76 per \$1,000 and \$3.52 for \$2,000; a man 50 years old will pay \$5.42 for \$2,000 and a man 55 years old will pay \$6.88 for \$2,000.

The new rates, according to the understanding of members discussing the question yesterday, will automatically require members to pay according to present ages, without reference to the age at which insurance was taken out—Sunday's Omaha World Herald.
