Willis P. Fulton, aged about 59 years died at his home in Barneston, on Friday of last week, after an illness of a short time.  
Mr. Fulton came to Webster county, with his parents, from Pennsylvania, in 1872. At about the age of 21 he went to Riverton and was there engaged in business for several years, later returning to Red Cloud where he conducted a grocery store for a number of years. Some five years ago he disposed of his interests here and located at Barneston where he had since been engaged in business.
