Nebraska Birds

More than 400 different kinds of birds make their homes in the state of Nebraska, according to the entomology department of the state university college of agriculture. However, the kinds of birds one ordinarily sees in western Nebraska are quite different from those commonly encountered along the Missouri River, and no given locality has as many as 400 birds. Any local bird list will grow slowly after the 200 mark has been passed. Further information may be found in Farmers' Bulletin Nos. 433, 456, 497, 506, 609, 621, and 630 and Yearbook Separates 416, 504, 564, 599, 601 and 620. These may be had upon application to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.
