### Commissioners Proceedings

March 13, 1917.  
Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment with all members present.  
On motion by Hubatka and seconded by Knigge the balance of \$2000 remaining in the special court house fund and \$2000 from the poor farm fund was ordered to be transferred to the general fund. Motion carried.  
Motion made by Hubatka and seconded by Shidler that the Indephone Telephone Co., and the Bell Telephone Co., be instructed to install their phones in the court house by underground cables. The county to pay the Independent Telephone Co. \$1.50 and the Bell Telephone Co. \$2.50 per month for each phone installed. Motion carried.  
On motion by Shidler and seconded by Hubatka the County Treasurer was instructed to pay the telephone, electric light and water bills each month for all of the county offices. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Shidler and seconded by Thomas, that the clerk be instructed to draw a warrant in favor of the State Auditor for \$500 to apply on the state claim against Webster county for \$337.47 on the Old Insane account. Motion carried.

H. J. Maurer appeared before the Board with a petition requesting the Board to allow the use of the court room for public gatherings. Motion made by Thomas and seconded by Knigge that this matter be deferred until the next meeting of the Board. On roll Thomas, Knigge and McCall, voted yes. Shidler and Hubatka no. Motion was carried.

County Assessor Hummel appeared before the Board and requested permission to appoint Frank Amack in Lloyd Ann's place as assessor in Garfield precinct. Permission was granted.

Motion made by Knigge and seconded by Shidler that Joe Saunders be appointed Road Overseer in District G, Elm Creek precinct in the place of Thos Barr. Motion carried.

The report of C. G. Pitney road overseer of Dist. No. 14 was approved by Board.

A petition was read from the citizens of Catherton precinct asking that W. R. Brooks be appointed Deputy Assessor for the year 1917. Petition granted.  
A petition was also presented from the voters of Glenwood precinct asking the Board to appoint Henry Stumpelhorst as assessor in Glenwood precinct to fill vacancy of M. R. Lewis. Petition granted.

Official Bond of J. C. Gear as Constable for the city of Red Cloud and appointed by Jas. Burden Justice of the Peace was approved.

The claims of Asa O'Donnell and John Roesener for \$175 each for injuries received in automobile accident on Oct. 4th, 1916, on highway between sections 29 and 29 township 1 range 10 were presented to the Board and after discussion a motion was made by Shidler and seconded by Thomas that these claims be allowed in settlement in full of all claims for damages which may have accrued or which may hereafter accrue by reason of any injury received by said O'Donnell and Roesener as per agreement on file and in full settlement of the \$500.00 suit brought by O'Donnell and \$10,000 suit brought by Roesener against Webster County.
